CINCINNATI, Ohio, June 14 (AP)—The trial of nineteen arrests and former salesmen and agents of the National Cash Register company, of Dayton, Ohio, on charges of contempt of court will be held September 24 in federal court here, as the result of the mandate of the United States supreme court, which has been received here.

The supreme court directed the United States district court to proceed with the trial when it reversed the decision of Judge South Hickerlooper, who had dismissed 18 of the 19 men charged with contempt.

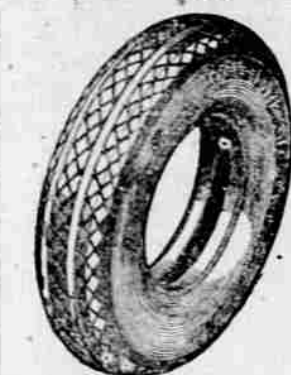
