

Farm Pointers

June is the time to think about getting grass seed for sowing on this fall's pastures. Several thousand acres of rye grass seed will be harvested within the next eight weeks and the rye grass is very important in pasture mixtures. Where one has the seed ready and is able to get the permit for burning at the right time, it is often possible to get the pasture planted under very "advantageous" conditions finds the experiment station.

The long stretch of dry weather during May was favorable to development of red spiders in some sections of Oregon where they have become serious pests of strawberries. Thorough spraying with highly refined summer oils, 1 to 1 1/2 gallons to 100 gallons of water is recommended by the experiment station, though tests have not been carried on many years as yet. Close picking just before spraying is advised. Spider injured foliage turns a sickly yellow.

Many new fields of alfalfa are being started in Oregon this year. If these fields are quite free from weeds the alfalfa is best allowed to grow until it gets to good bloom and then clipped or taken for a hay crop. Should there be an unusual development of weeds that shade the alfalfa the field is better clipped as the alfalfa will survive the clipping while many of the weeds do not. There is no advantage in clipping alfalfa unless the weeds are shading it rather seriously, finds the experiment station.

Strawberry root weevils may be successfully controlled in June by applying the poisoned apple bait, says the entomologist at the experiment station. The commercial pro-

duct, "Go West" is good or bait can be made at home by mixing 50 pounds dried ground apple with 5 pounds calcium arsenate. Between a teaspoonful and table-spoonful is placed in the crown of each plant.

Sweet clover will grow almost anywhere, provided there is a total of more than 17 inches of rain and sufficient time in the soil. However, in spite of the fact that sweet

clover is a hardy plant, it is not always easy to get a stand. Lime, inoculation, and a firm seed bed are three essentials in obtaining a stand of sweet clover. It may not always be necessary to neutralize an acid soil, but the crop commonly must have lime if it is to do well.

Butler arrived in Superior by an early train.

GLACIER PARK TRAILS REPAIRED, EXTENDED

(AP)—A comprehensive plan of construction and reconstruction of 400 trails in Glacier National park has been started and will continue until all major trails are up to the highest possible standard. An initial appropriation of \$48,000 this year has been made for equipment, materials and labor. The work will be continued in subsequent seasons.

SCIENTISTS USE BEETLES AS FOOD TEST SUBJECTS

use, staff members say. Less time is required for experiments if beetles are used, they say, because developments come more quickly than when animals are used.

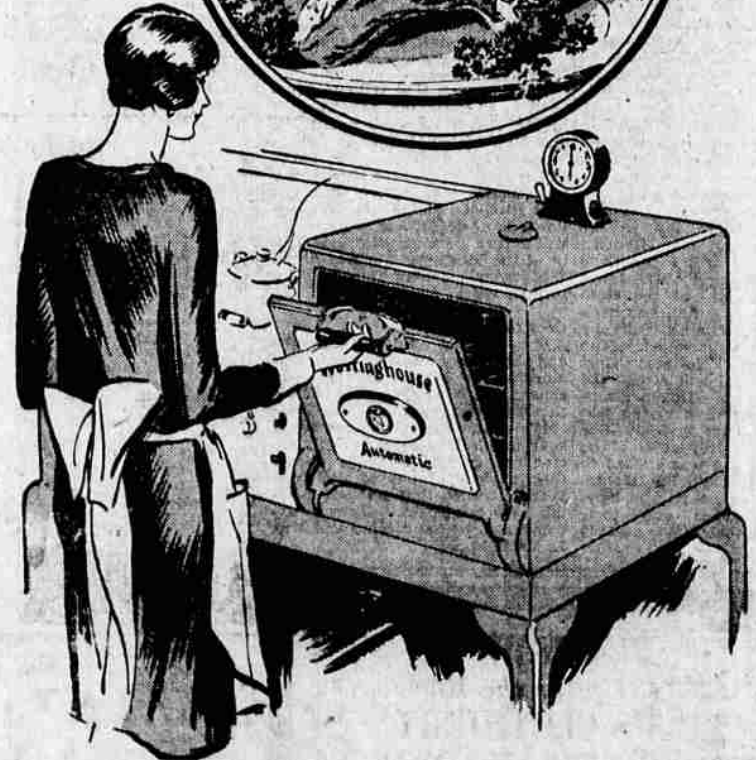
