SCHOOL VOTELess Than 200 Ballots
Marked at Annual Elec-
tion Here MondayBOTH CANDIDATES
HAVE BIG MARGINElections Also Held at
Union, Liberty, River-
side and Willowdale
Yesterday Afternoon

F. A. Epling and Dr. J. L. Ingle were elected to the board of education of district No. 1, which includes La Grande, at the annual election held here yesterday afternoon from 2 until 7 o'clock. Mr. Epling, who was re-elected for a three-year term, received 182 votes and Dr. Ingle, who was elected to fill the unexpired term of Dr. R. P. Landis, received 179.

Balloting took place in the Central school building on the south side of the O.W. tracks and at the Greenwood school building on the north side.

The board is expected to reorganize for the coming school year at a meeting in the near future.

UNION, Ore., June 19 (Special)—C. L. Caldwell was re-elected to the school board of district No. 5, which includes Union, and F. N. Fox was re-elected as clerk at the annual election held in the high school building yesterday afternoon.

The clerk's annual report shows that the bond issue—voted that the high school be built—is just about paid off and the district is gradually getting on a better financial basis, so that it will be possible to lower the tax levy. In one more year the bonds will all be retired.

Local Baseball
Club Is Facing
Financial Crisis

The La Grande baseball club must raise several hundred dollars within the next two or three days or it is faced with the necessity of disbanding, dropping from the pennant almost in its grasp, and giving the city as a whole a "black eye," according to a statement today by Joe Keeney, president.

A baseball meeting was held last night and the financial situation was thoroughly threshed out. The payroll for the local players is due and must be met immediately and there is not enough money available, by several hundred dollars, to meet the indebtedness, it is said. The president of the club feels that the baseball team this year has done much towards advertising La Grande and gave the city a "black eye" but it is impossible to continue through with the schedule, the result would be disastrous to the city as a whole and would reflect in many adverse ways.

It is not the intention of the club to attempt to maintain the present organization through the remainder of the season, rather it is the plan to release some of the players as soon as their salaries are paid and go through the rest of the schedule with a team that will require less money to finance. In this way it is hoped to remain in the race, clinch the pennant, and come out of the season without a financial loss.

Committees are being organized today to attempt to raise the necessary sum, Mr. Keeney says. He urges that all who are called upon respond to the requests of the committees so that the financial crisis may be averted.

MOTORISTS ROUTED
THROUGH
CENTRAL
IS REPORTTourists Tell of Mislead-
ing Information Given
at Ontario, Arlington

That La Grande, Baker, Pendleton and other cities along the Old Oregon Trail are getting a poor deal at the hands of the promoters and supporters of the John Day highway, has been hinted at and reported for several weeks now by tourists who are passing through this city—and passing through this season in much smaller numbers than for years past, according to owners of tourist camps, past, present employees and others who are in a position to know.

Tourists staying here over night have been stating that at Arlington and also at Ontario the two points along the way where travel might be diverted from the Old Oregon Trail highway to the John Day, cars have been stopped and the drivers advised to take the John Day, rather than the other and much more scenic route. In many instances this advice has been followed, since most tourists are concerned for the welfare of their cars and also have to save time.

Of all the stories which have come to the attention of La Grande people perhaps the most distorted was that related last evening by a carload of tourists passing through La Grande from Dubuque, Ia., to Portland. They reported that at

8000 Boys, Girls
Remember Meredith

DES MOINES, June 19 (AP)—Eight thousand boys and girls will remember Edwin T. Meredith, who died Sunday, as the man who financed their start in the livestock or farm industry.

WITHDRAWAL
OF RITCHIE
STIRS DEMOSForces Working for Nom-
ination of Smith Given
Impetus TodayHOUSTON BUZZING
AT DEVELOPMENTSenator Reed Believes He
Controls Enough Votes
Now to Block New York
Governor.

BALTIMORE, June 19 (AP)—Forces working for the nomination of Governor Smith of New York at the democratic national convention were given impetus today with the withdrawal of Governor Albert C. Ritchie, of Maryland, as a candidate.

Stating that "It has become increasingly evident that the great majority of the democratic party in almost every section of the country are ready and want to align themselves behind the leadership of Governor Smith," the Marylander, in pledging his support to the Empire state chieftain, said that "Governor Ritchie, who has far away the best chance to win."

Lauding Governor Smith's record which he said "justified the people's faith in democracy," Governor Ritchie said that his withdrawal from the presidential field was prompted by a sense of duty which he was glad to perform on the basis that "whatever contribution to democratic unity, will, in turn, contribute to democratic victory."

In aligning himself with the Smith cohorts, Governor Ritchie, in response to a question as to whether he would accept the vice presidency should it be offered, made it clear that he had no ambitions in that direction.

HOUSTON BUZZING

HOUSTON, Tex., June 19 (AP)—Withdrawal of Governor Albert C. Ritchie of Maryland from the democratic presidential nomination race had set political circles in buzzing here a week before the national democratic convention, June 26.

It brought a statement from the headquarters of Senator James A. Reed of Missouri that the candidacy of the Missourian would prove a big barrier in the national plans of Alfred Smith.

Clean Shaver, chairman of the national democratic committee, conferred behind closed doors with political leaders and refused to comment on the action of the Maryland governor, but Edward S. Villamore, Senator Reed's campaign manager, declared the Missouri senator controls enough votes to block the nomination of Governor Smith.

Characterizing Senator Reed as "the country's most valiant warrior," Mr. Villamore branded as propaganda, claims that Governor Smith would be rewarded with the nomination.

Arrival of party leaders from several states, brought conflicting claims concerning doubtful delegations.

HUSBAND KILLED;
BRIDE ARRESTEDWealthy Retired Chicago
Druggist Shot in
Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, June 19 (AP)—Mrs. Glad Glab, 29, two months' bride of John I. Glab, wealthy retired Chicago druggist, who was shot to death last night at Van Nuys, and two other persons were booked on suspicion of murder charges today.

The others arrested were Miss Esther Kaiser, 17, of Oklahoma City, Okla., niece of Mrs. Glab, and M. A. Wilson, caretaker of the Glab estate at Van Nuys.

Formal arrest of the trio followed a statement by the suburban captain of police that the stories told by the three persons conflicted in important details.

Amish Theory Held
Glab was shot through the right chest as he apparently was about to enter an automobile in front of his home. The police theory was that someone had been lying in wait for the retired Chicagoan.

Simultaneously with the arrests, police were requested to locate Glab's first wife, from whom he received a final divorce decree 30 days before marrying his present wife. The first Mrs. Glab was believed to be living in the film city. She will be questioned by investigators, police said.

Wilson told police that he heard the shot which killed the druggist. With his wife and P. A. Krupp, a neighbor, he ran to the front of the home to find Glab already dead.

Mrs. Glab said she and her niece were playing cards in the house and did not hear the shot.

Krupp declared that while he was running across the street toward the Glab home he saw a man leaving the grounds of the California club, nearby, enter an automobile and drive away.

No Money Taken

The position of Glab's body and the range of the bullet led to the police theory that the slayer probably had concealed himself in the front seat of the automobile.

Finding of several hundred dollars on the druggist's body disposed of robbery as a motive for the killing, but police said they were investigating reports that the shooting might have been the outcome of a Chicago feud. They did not reveal what the reports were.

Italian Birdman
Unsuccessful In
Northern SearchMajor Maddalena Re-
turns from Flight with-
out Finding Noble and
His Party.

ROME, June 19 (AP)—Major Maddalena, Italian flier, made an unsuccessful search for the Noble party this morning and returned to Kings Bay, Spitzbergen. He is planning another flight shortly in his Savoia-Marchetti-55.

A message received by the Citta di Milano, base ship at Kings Bay, and made public by the official News agency Stefani, said that Major Maddalena, who arrived in Kings Bay from Norway last night, took off early this morning and flew over the Braganza and then on past North Cape to the region in which General Noble and his five stranded companions are waiting for relief.

Gone Six Hours
Just as the Norwegian flier, Captain Hildebrandsen and Lieutenant Luitens, Helin, had failed in three previous attempts to sight the Noble party, Major Maddalena also was unsuccessful in his search and returned to Kings Bay after six hours.

Now that visual efforts to find General Noble and his red tent pitched amidst the rough ice off Northeast land have failed, an effort will be made to keep the 8-55 which is equipped with radio, in touch with the Noble party.

General Noble has been informed that during the next flight of the 8-55 it will be necessary for him to use his own radio post to guide the big plane as soon as it comes into sight.

Nelson Assured;
Shipsted Winner

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 19 (AP)—Nomination of Arthur E. Nelson of St. Paul as republican candidate for United States senator, was conceded today by his nearest opponent as additional returns came in from Monday's primary.

United States Senator Henrik Shipstead, former laborer, was renominated by a wide majority in yesterday's state primary.

Senator Shipstead's nomination was the walk away his supporters had predicted and ran better than 10-1 over Watkins of Minneapolis.

Governor Theodore Christiansen renomination on the republican ticket was on a basis of more than 2-1 over George T. Simpson of Minneapolis.

PORTLAND, Me., June 19 (AP)—United States Senator Frederick Hale was renominated for a third term in the republican primary yesterday, easily defeating Governor Ralph O. Brewster. Ira G. Hersey, republican who is serving his sixth term as representative from the Fourth district was defeated for renomination by Donald W. Snow, a Bangor attorney.

In a four cornered contest for the republican nomination for Governor, William Tudor Gardner, wealthy resident of Gardner and former speaker of the Maine house of representatives, received more votes than his opponents combined.

Navy's time was 9 minutes 42 seconds, considerably behind the record of 9 minutes 11 3/5 seconds set by Cornell in 1929.

WOMAN FLIER
WELCOMED AT
SOUTHAMPTONFriendship Flies from
Burry Port, Where It
Ended Long TripAMELIA EARHART
HEROINE OF HOURWilmur Stultz Talks of
Return Trip—Aviators
Drive to London in Au-
tomobiles.

LONDON, June 19 (AP)—Miss Amelia Earhart, trans-Atlantic flier, arrived in London from Southampton by automobile late today and reached her hotel at 8:20 p. m.

CURTIS FIELD, N. Y., June 19 (AP)—Fog all along the course caused Miss Thera Rasche, German stunt flier to postpone a flight to Old Orchard beach today. At the Maine Beach Miss Rasche will prepare for a transatlantic flight backed by Mrs. James A. Stillman.

SOUTHAMPTON, England, June 19 (AP)—Speeding swiftly from the little town of Burry Port on the south coast of Wales, scene of its unexpected landing yesterday from the other side of the Atlantic, the American monoplane Friendship carrying the first woman ever to fly the ocean, arrived here today.

Southampton has welcomed many famous visitors but none has ever been given a more tremendous welcome than Miss Amelia Earhart and her two companions on their great flight, Wilmur Stultz, the pilot and Louis Gorman, mechanic.

Gracious Landing

The big yellow bulk of the transatlantic plane was first discovered over a misty squall above Southampton water a few minutes after 1 o'clock. For a moment the machine appeared off its course, heading up the river Test but fast convey of two airplanes set her on the right course again and the Friendship came gracefully to the surface at exactly 11:19 after a flight from Burry Port of two hours and two minutes.

From the cockpit showed the smiling faces of Stultz and Miss Earhart. As soon as the machine settled on the water the side doors were opened and Gordon dropped to one of the pontoons, pulled out a cigarette and calmly lit it.

Two ropes were fastened to the plane and it was towed three quarters of a mile to the landing stage of the Imperial Airways. A boat with Mrs. Frederick Gorman, sponsor of the flight, Raymond Guest, her son, A. K. Mills of Boston and the correspondent for the Associated Press tied up alongside of the plane and brought the party ashore.

Mrs. Guest Pleased
Miss Earhart was taken off first and as Mrs. Guest embraced her, the sponsor of the flight said:

"Well done, my girl!"

Miss Earhart smiled and thanked Mrs. Guest profusely. She was quite jolly, but a little too over- come with emotion to talk much.

The party was then brought ashore by John M. Savage, American consul and was
