Mrs. Van Buren Tells Of Early Days in Valley

Stories of the pioneer days of the Grande Ronde valley are always interesting and particularly so is the story told by Mrs. Frederick Van Buren, of Tekon, Wash., who has been spending the past three weeks at Hot Lake sanatorium.

Mrs. Van Buren's home was at Red Cloud, Nebraska and she and her mother left there in April, 1882 to join her father, who was living near Walla Walla. They took what was called the fast passenger to Shoshone, Idaho and from there had to go by coach to Walla Walla. The coach was one of the old Concord coaches where the passengers faced each other and were rather narrow. It being a case of knee brushing knee. Mrs. Van Buren states that she had the earliest time since she slept on the laps of the passengers.

One day at noon, the stage halted at the Hot Springs. Here there was a log cabin and a livery stable for horses. A man and his wife served lunch for the passengers and they all drank the spring water and Mrs. Van Buren declares that the water tastes the same as it did back in 1882. Then on again to La Grande and through the mountains. The roads were very bad, being muddy and in places icy. Here the driver would make the horses run swiftly so that the coach would not slide off the road and to Mrs. Van Buren, these runs were the thrills of the trip. They were fourteen days going from Hastings, the nearest large city to Red Cloud, to Pendleton. Mrs. Van Buren says that her first trip was made by coach, her second visit to the lake was by train, she expects to return home by stage and hopes when she returns later to the valley that she will be able to travel by airplane.

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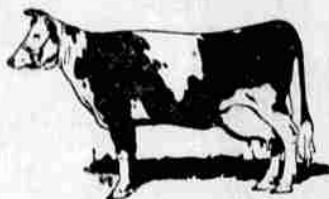
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
