AT THE THEATERS

Drama of Air Furnishes Many Thrills

It was not so long ago that the first real epic of the war in the air swept across the motion picture horizon, establishing itself as the forerunner of its kind and leaving no doubt in the minds of the general public that here, truly, was a screen story that would live.

Paramount, however, took up its own challenge and produced "The Legion of the Condemned," called the companion picture to "Wings," which comes to the Arcade Theater for a three day run.

It is a good, sound, interesting story showing in full detail the hazardous yet romantic life of a group of branded men at the front—a group of men who owed debts to society and felt that only death could expiate their sins. Nothing was too dangerous, any mission that was brought on was dispatched with reckless abandon, so that soon they became the talk of the front and of the entire world when feats of valor were discussed.

Into this group is projected young Gary Cooper as the American aviator, who wishes to die in the service of his country, and in the part of his sweetheart, the high spot in the story comes when Cooper is forced to carry the sweetheart (Fay Wray) across the German lines as a spy.

Entrusted with the direction of "The Legion of the Condemned" was William Wellman, who handled the megaphone on "Wings" and had a script prepared by John Monk Saunders, the author of the great roadshow, Wellman, himself a flier in the Lafayette Squadron during the war, has left nothing undone to portray truthfully the exploits of the birdmen.

In many of the flying sequences the spectator is carried along in the cockpit of the "ship," living really the life of the aviator in battle. And the men who handled the "planes" were those pilots who had made names for themselves as aces during the World War. Captain S. C. Campbell, of the British; Ted Parsons, of the French; and Lieut. Ralph Schud, of the German Air corps, take part in the production.

Fay Wray, as the spy-sweetheart, and Gary Cooper, as the young American aviator, give performances which are excellent. They are supported by Barry Norton, Lane Chandler, Francis McDonald, Vova George, Freeman Wood, E. H. Calvert and Charlot Bird.

Indians Play Important Part In "Wyoming"

Many famous Indians, who were prominent in the early history of the state of Wyoming, are seen in Tim McCoy's new western film drama, "Wyoming," which will be shown at the Star theater Thursday and Friday.

Among these red men are Water Man and Left Hand, two of the five Arapahos who joined the Sioux of Sitting Bull and participated in the massacre of Custer's command at the battle of the Little Big Horn.

Another famous red man is Goes In the Lodge, war chief against a scout for General Crook in the Sioux wars.

More than a thousand feathered and painted Shoshone and Arapaho Indians from the Wind River reservation appear in the thrilling Indian sequences of the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer picture directed by W. S. Van Dyke.

Dorothy Sebastian has the featured feminine lead.

Tim McCoy, Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer western star who has gained great popularity in pictures based on American historical incidents and is one of the most delightful western melodramas he has thus far brought to the screen.

McCoy appears in "Wyoming" in the role of a United States cavalry officer stationed in the Indian country of the far west just prior to the Civil War. The story, which was written especially for McCoy by Madeleine Rutven and Ross Wills, is based on the invasion of what is now Wyoming by the emigrant trains which set out from the Missouri valley to settle the Indian hunting lands.

Most of the picture was filmed in Wyoming under the direction of W. S. Van Dyke. The leading feminine role is taken by Dorothy Sebastian.

Dorothy Sebastian, who appeared opposite Tim McCoy in "California" plays opposite Tim McCoy in "Wyoming" as the daughter of a pioneer settler who is captured by the Indians.
