HOUSTON DRESSED UP FOR CAUCUS

Reed, Smith and Hull Campaigns Launched in Texas City—Preparing Mammoth Coliseum

Bound for Houston, the mecca of the democratic party just now, the democratic delegates to the national convention from Oregon were on a special car on train No. 34 this morning and took a breath of Grande Ronde valley air at the depot as the embarking passenger stopped.

They were joined by Attorney W. M. Peterson, one of the delegates at Pendleton and also by Compton I. White, of Clark's Fork, Ida., a delegate from the neighboring state, who came down from Spokane. The Southern Idaho delegation will swell the party at Boise and other cars will be added at Ogden. Then at Kansas City a special train of the finest new Pullmans will be made up by the U. P. and will bear the western delegates and two cars of Smith boosters from New York to the convention city.

Delegates are anticipating with keen pleasure their part in the trip from Kansas City to Houston that will bring representatives together from both seaboard of the nation.

Attorney J. E. Carson, of Portland, who has been in charge of the Smith campaign in Oregon was apparently in charge of the group this morning though no formal organization had as yet been formed.

Delegates were becoming acquainted with the pleasant informality that is known perhaps only to travelers.
