Miss Lily Kennedy, of La Grande, visited Miss Ruby Wanker over Sunday and Monday.

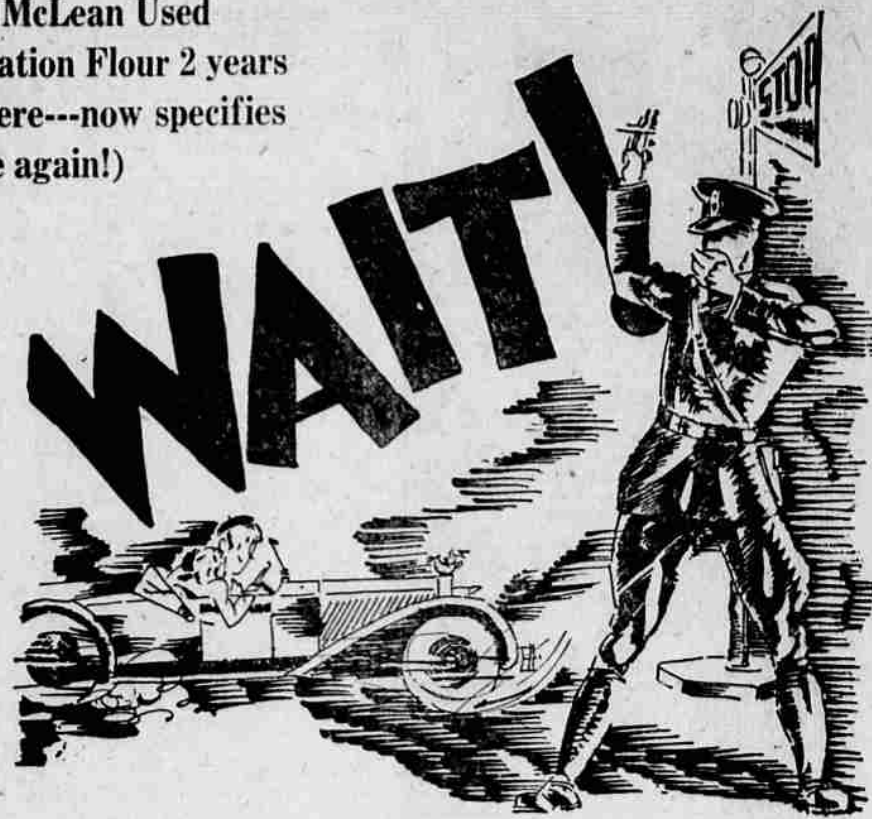
Coyotes and hawks are killing Vivian Kennedy's lambs. He has lost three or four lambs the last day or two. Both he and his herder are hunting for the slayers.
