Baseball Same As 20 Years Ago Says "Ed" Walsh

CHICAGO (AP)—Twenty years have failed to produce anything new in baseball for "Big" Ed Walsh, one of the greatest pitchers of all time.

Walsh, a member of the White Sox board of strategy, asserts the only improvement he has noted has been in the baseball itself. "That's as lively as a rabbit, remarked the former spit ball artist, 'but the game is not being played any better or any faster by present day stars.'"

In a moment of reminiscence, Walsh recalled the famous White Sox of 1908, the "Black Sox" of 1919 and the Athletics of 1914, the great team that Connie Mack broke up. The Yankees, as a fielding combination, do not compare with either of those teams, Walsh declares. He says, however, the offensive power of the Yankees is greater.

"During my tenure in the American league," Walsh said, "all of the clubs were tough, with every club having at least three real pitchers. You do not find that today."

The 1906 White Sox with Sullivan catching, Dick White, Nick Altrock, Roy Patterson, Nip Owen, Ed White and myself pitching. Dornbush at first, Isabell on second, Davis at short and Tarnhill on third; Dougherty, Jones and O'Neill in the outfield, was a great team. It was not a great hitting club, but the boys knew baseball and played it all the time. I have not noted any improvement over their work in any team today, except possibly in hitting."

Walsh—now 47—will introduce his oldest son Ed, Jr., to baseball this summer as a member of the White Hose. A year or two later, Bob, another son, will be given a chance in the big show. Ed Jr., at present is the star finger for the Notre Dame nine, which Walsh helps to develop each spring.

In the battle of the lower depths, Washington consolidated its hold on fifth place and menaced fourth by trimming the Red Sox 8-2.
