Log Roll Desserts
1 lb. marmalows
1/2 cup cream
1/2 lb. dates
1/2 lb. Honeyd Graham crackers
1/2 cup walnut meats
1 pint Blue Mountain whipping cream.
Soak the cut marmalows in the 1/2 cup thin cream. Stone and cut up dates. Cut up walnut meats. Roll the graham crackers. Mix all together thoroughly. Mold into a cylinder or log shape. Let stand several hours. Serve in slices with whipped cream. This serves 8.
Frosted Fruit Salad
1/3 cup of stiff mayonnaise
2/3 cup Blue Mountain cream whipped
1 teaspoon gelatine
3 tablespoons syrup from canned fruit or water
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cups salad fruit, pineapples, cherries, strawberries, oranges, or white grapes.
Soak gelatine in water. Heat until dissolved. Add to mayonnaise. Fold in sliced fruit and whipped cream. Pack in refrigerator pans. Let stand 2 to 3 hours. Serve on lettuce with mayonnaise.
Frozen Crab Salad
1 cup crab
1/2 cup white sauce
1/2 cup water
1/2 teaspoon gelatine
1/2 teaspoon salt
Sprinkle nutmeg
1/2 cup Blue Mountain cream, whipped.
Soak gelatine in cold water. Add to white sauce. Add flaked crab meat. Add seasoning. Leave until cold. Add whipped cream to mayonnaise. Fold into crab mixture. Freeze in refrigerator pan or in mould packed in ice and salt.
A New Mayonnaise
1 egg
1 tablespoon sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon mustard
1/2 teaspoon paprika
1/2 cup vinegar
1/2 cup salad oil
1/2 cup cornstarch
1 cup water
Put egg, seasoning, vinegar, and salad oil into a bowl. Don't stir. Mix cornstarch with 1/2 cup water. Add 1/2 cup boiling water. Cook until thick and clear. Pour this hot paste into mixture in bowl. Beat with an egg beater until thoroughly blended. Let stand till cool. This makes one pint of mayonnaise.
Cheese Pin Wheels
Cut crusts from sandwich loaf of McWilliams white bread. Spread length of loaf generously with creamed butter. Cut slice 1/4 inch thick lengthwise of loaf. Spread with pimento cream or cream cheese. Roll lengthwise like jelly roll. Keep in moist cloth till ready to use. Cut into 1/4-inch slices like cinnamon rolls. Toast in broiling oven. Serve with salad. May be cut into 1 1/2-inch lengths instead of this slices.
Canton Tea Biscuit
Make standard baking powder biscuit dough, using 2 cups Fed-

eration flour. Roll out into rectangle. Cream 1/3 cup cream cheese with syrup from preserved ginger. Add 2 tablespoons finely chopped ginger. Roll up like jelly roll. Cut into 1-inch thick slices. Place 2 inches apart on greased pan. Bake in quick oven.
Iced Mexican Chocolate
2 cups milk
1/4 cup ground Preferred Stock coffee
4-inch pieces stick cinnamon
4 cups cold Blue Mt. milk
4 squares chocolate
1/2 cup boiling water
1/2 cup sugar
2 teaspoons Burnett's vanilla
Scald 2 cups milk with coffee and cinnamon. Strain. Melt chocolate, add boiling water and sugar. Stir well. Roll 5 minutes. Add the scalded milk. Cool. Add vanilla and the 4 cups cold milk. Serve in tall glasses over crushed ice. Top with whipped cream.
Butterscotch Biscuit
4 cups Federation flour
8 teaspoons K-C baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1/3 cup shortening
1/3 cup Blue Mt. milk
2/3 cup Meadow Harvest butter
1/2 cup brown sugar
Mix first 5 ingredients as same as for baking powder biscuit. Roll into rectangle 1/4 inch thick. Cream butter and brown sugar. Spread over dough. Roll up like jelly roll. Cut 1 inch thick. Bake on greased pan at 450 F. for 15 minutes. Make 2 dozen. May add chopped pecans to filling mixture.
Gelatine Salad Frozen
1/2 envelope Knox gelatine
4 tablespoons water
2 egg yolks
3 tablespoons sugar
1 tablespoon Meadow Harvest butter
2 tablespoons pineapple juice
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon paprika
1/3 cup vinegar
2/3 cup Blue Mt. milk
1 cup Blue Mt. whipping cream
1 cup mixed fruit
Soak the gelatine in the water. Heat the milk. Add vinegar, egg, gelatine and seasoning. Cook till thick. Cool. Stir well. As the dressing begins to set, fold in 1 cup whipped cream and the cup of cut fruit. Chill or freeze in mold. Serve on lettuce with mayonnaise.
Ginger Jellied Fruit Salad
2/3 cup syrup from canned fruit
2 tablespoons gelatine
2 tablespoons cold water
2 tablespoons sugar
1/2 cup lemon juice
1 cup ginger ale
1 cup Preferred Stock canned fruit
2 tablespoons Canton ginger
Pinch salt
Add gelatine soaked in cold water to boiling syrup. Add salt, sugar, cold. Add lemon juice, ginger etc. When begins to set, stir in fruit and ginger. Turn into molds. Serve with mayonnaise and whipped cream.
Gingerbread Waffles
1 egg
1/2 cup Meadow Harvest butter, melted
1 cup molasses
1 teaspoon soda in

Ice Box Rolls

1 yeast cake
1/2 cup luke-warm water
2/3 cup shortening
2/3 cup sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup mashed potatoes
1 cup Blue Mt. milk
2 eggs
3/4 cups Federation flour
Scald milk. Add shortening, mashed potatoes, sugar, salt, eggs well beaten, yeast, and flour. Mix well. Put into ice box until ready to use. Shape. Let rise. Bake.

GRANTS PASS, June 22 (AP)—With only one Indian still running and he not in the money, the Redwood Indian marathon is near its close and six Indians are richer by \$10,000—the amount of the prizes for which 30 redskinned runners started from San Francisco at 10:20 a. m. June 14.
As far as the runners are concerned the marathon is over. It is unlikely that Iniqua Silver Wings, the seventh man, and the only one still on the road, will finish as he was still more than 22 miles out at 5:30 this morning.
Melika, the colorful old Zuni, came in second at 5:57 last night, eight hours and 37 minutes later than Flying Cloud, winner of the event. Melika was pounding along steadily and spurted the last few blocks through the crowds that gave the old man a real ovation.

"Tourist travel should increase from now on and we must be fully prepared to take care of it—the only way we can get together on all these matters and thrash each one out to conclusion is: All interested in tourist travel, our highway conditions, the ways and means to attract more travel under the present existing circumstances, to meet at the Chamber of Commerce office, next Monday night at 7:30 o'clock, for full and open discussion of every phase pertaining to the situation. If the various lines associated with the handling of tourists, supplies, accommodations, etc., are properly represented at the proposed meeting it is reasonable that it should result in certain understandings and conclusions that may be widely beneficial.
