Air Picture Showing At Arcade

It was not so long ago that the first real epic of the war in the air swept across the motion picture horizon, establishing itself as the foremost of its kind and leaving no doubt in the minds of the general public that here, truly, was a screen story that would live.

"I am, however, took up its challenge and produced 'The Legion of the Condemned,' called the companion picture to 'Wings.' It came to the Arcade theater for a run of three days last night.

It is a good, sound, interesting story showing in full detail the hazardous yet romantic life of a group of branded men at the front—a group of men who owed debts to society and felt that only death could expiate their sins. Tim McCoy Plays Cavalry Role In Film

There is no doubt that Tim McCoy was born to the saddle.

His splendid physique, remarkable carriage and ability to ride as only American cavalry can sit, a horse, makes him one of the most imposing and soldierly figures on the screen today.

McCoy makes a heroic figure in his new Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer historical western drama, "Wyoming," which is now being shown at the Star theater.

Practically all of the cavalry in the state of Wyoming are also seen in action with the Indians.

In every respect, this amazing story of a colored dancer and two ring fighters, is worthy of the commendation it has received everywhere. It packed the famous Roxy theater in New York at every showing and inasmuch as this is the largest motion picture theater in the world, this is the highest praise that can be advanced for it.
