## EGG VALUES UP: BUTTER STEADY

### Both Grades of Mediums Jump Cent and a Half in Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., June 22 (AP)—Egg values advanced sharply late yesterday, all grades moving up from 1/2 to 1 1/2¢ per dozen. Both grades of mediums showed the greatest strength, jumping a cent and a half to 26¢ on extras and to 25 1/2¢ on firsts. Standard firsts advanced a cent to 23¢, while standard extras rose a half cent to the same figure. Continued light receipts coupled with good storage demand and higher prices in the south indicate that prices will remain firm.

Butter prices were unchanged but the market was firm and into-storage movement fairly large at 9,644 pounds. Receipts yesterday were: Eggs, 1,825 cases; butter, 11,187 pounds. Storage holdings were: Butter, 557,567 pounds; eggs, 69,517 cases.

Country dressed meats and poultry showed no price changes today and trading was normal. Receipts were moderate but enough to satisfy demand.

Strawberries were about steady at yesterday's quotations but other classes of berries were a shade easier.

Potato prices were unchanged.

## Trading In Wall Street Dullest Of the Season

NEW YORK, June 22 (AP)—Desultory trading characterized today's stock market, one of the dullest full sessions of the year. Prices started forward at the opening, slipped back before midday, and then started upward again in the early afternoon, repeating the performance of the last few days.

The closing was strong. Another bullish demonstration in the rally, especially the southern group, had a heartening effect on speculative sentiment in the final hour. Various industrials rose, Pittsburgh and West Virginia, Texas and Pacific and Western Maryland gained 6 to 7 points, Peoria and Western 4 and Wallash 3. Active buying of New York and Harlem carried it up 65 points to the 300 level again; LaCade advanced 13 points. Total sales approximated 1,500,000 shares.

## Wheat Easy And Lower At Close

CHICAGO, June 22 (AP)—Opening 1/2 to 1 1/2¢ up, Chicago wheat later held near to the initial range. Corn, oats and provisions were also firmer, with corn starting at 1/2 to 3/4¢ advance, and subsequent

gaining a little more. Wheat closed easy, 1/2 to 3/4¢ net lower; corn unchanged to 1/2¢ off, oats varying from 1/2¢ decline to 1/2¢ advance, and provisions 2¢ down to 2¢ up.

### WOOL REPORT

BOSTON, June 22 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin of tomorrow will say:

"The wool market is slow and easy with prices in favor of the buyer, though not to any marked degree, most holders of wool being firmly of the opinion that the mills will need all the wool in sight for the next six months.

"There is a bull also in buying in the country, where prices are somewhat lower, 12 months wools at Keokuk, Texas, having been sold at about \$1.12, clean landed Boston, against \$1.16 @ 1.18 at the peak of the contract, at which time these wools were relatively too high.

"The manufacturing end of the business is slow at the moment, although there is ample time for the repeat business in heavyweights to get started.

"Mohair is slow and without material change, most interest being in the foreign markets."
