SEVERAL SCHOOLS IN COUNTY RECEIVE STANDARD RANKING

County superintendent of schools E. A. Sayre, has recently completed the list of schools in Union county which have earned, through the meeting of various requirements, the certificate awarded to "Standard Schools." These schools are North Powder, Summerville, Frosty, Elgin, Perry and Fruitdale are really the only schools in the list which can be classed as purely rural school. For that reason, it is said, they have made quite an achievement in making the grade.

Among others, these items—the owning and daily displaying of a United States flag; proper lighting, which in this case means windows equal to one-fifth of the floor space; proper equipment; proper heating and ventilation; appearance of the school room or rooms; possession of a certain number of standard pictures; well kept and equipped grounds; a Parent-Teacher association; proper sanitation; proper out-buildings; teacher with proper preparation; a good school library, good attendance records, a supply of supplementary readers and visits at least annually by members of the school board.

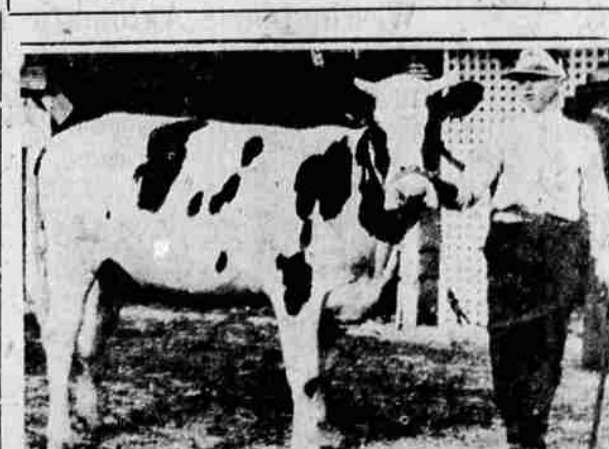
