The victory sent the Cardinals spinning another notch upward yesterday as the Reds struggled under the drive of the Pirates in Pittsburgh, 13 to 1. Burlington Grimes pitched at top speed throughout. Cold weather, on the second day of summer, forced the Robins and the Braves into abeyance at Boston, while rain followed the Giants to Philadelphia.

Ocean Fliers To Return Home On June 28, Report

LONDON, (Special, June 22 (AP)—The flight of London's welcome has begun to pull on Miss Amelia Earhart and three were indications today that perhaps she has let her days become too crowded.

Miss Earhart slept today until nearly noon and upon awakening cancelled all her engagements for the day except the luncheon at the American embassy where she was the guest of Mrs. Alington B. Houghton, wife of the American ambassador.

Friends of Miss Earhart remarked that she had not been holding up well in the last several days. Yesterday, it was said, she had been hard on her, six companions leaving no time at all to her self.

The Hamilton luncheon was a simple private affair, attended only by the embassy staff, including the air attaché, Major Hubert H. Bannister, Lieutenant Commander R. K. Karpowicz, and Mrs. Frederick G. G. M. Karpowicz's mother, and Miss Earhart herself.

Early today Earl Stutz and James Gordon, pilot and navigator of their flight from Tientsin, lay to their port, Wales, flew from London to Manchester, where they played a match on the grass of St. John's Church, first floor to cross the Atlantic. They intended to return to London this afternoon.

The three American fliers will return to the United States aboard the steamship Roosevelt on June 28.
