HEALTH CAMPING OUT

The big business man and the physician are advised by their physician to "get away from everything for a while." This advice is the result of the speed and pressure of present day urban life, the tension of which in making out-of-door vacations more and more of a necessity. The clerk, the skilled artisan, the business and professional man, the housewife, and the children will profit by spending a certain amount of time each year away from the hustle and bustle of the city.

Happily, the same industrial development which has made life more artificial has provided transportation facilities which enable most of us to get into the country, the woods, or the mountains and benefit by the recreation, the exercise, the wholesome fatigue and deep sleep, the fresh air, the stimulated appetite, and the sunshine of the out-of-doors. The automobile has made tourists and campers of millions of people who, lacking such means of transportation, would rarely if ever get away from home and into the country.

A decade ago, when camping in out-of-the-way places, one needed to give but little thought to the danger of contracting disease from the environment, but today borders of tourists reach the most remote parts of our country, making the danger of human contamination practically universal. To prevent dangerous pollution of camping sites and water supplies, a sanitary code in regard to the disposal of bodily excreta, wastes, and garbage should be accepted and rigidly adhered to by tourists and campers.

The selection of water for drinking purposes, for cooking, and for the washing of vegetables should be made with care. Underground water from wells or springs properly constructed to prevent surface contamination are usually safe, but surface water from streams, lakes, or springs, no matter how clear or sparkling, may have been polluted by other campers and contain germs of typhoid, dysentery, or diarrhea and should be used only after thorough boiling or treatment with some disinfectant, such as hypochlorite of lime.

Milk purchased along the way may be an even greater hazard than the water because, if it comes from diseased cattle or is contaminated by the dirt from the stable, by the animals, by the milkmen, or by other persons handling the milk and then set kept at a temperature very near the freezing point, the germs will multiply so rapidly that the milk becomes a veritable culture of bacteria. Such milk may contain the germs of typhoid, tuberculosis, scarlet fever, diphtheria, sore throat, or summer diarrhea and, if used by children or adults without boiling, may produce serious illness and disease.
