THE EYE HEALTH SURVEY

Strange as it may seem, the eye, one of the most important factors in determining early symptoms of disease, is regarded by many as negligible and a rather superficial test of vision is usually considered sufficient. Now, normal vision is only just one of the requisites of sound eyes. There are a lot of others, and it requires a physician thoroughly trained in eye examination to determine them. A man may have a wonderful grip and yet be a sufferer from some neuro-muscular disease; he may have normal vision and be proud of his eagle eye when expert examination would show signs, unmistakable evidence of some disease condition already at work.

Medical men speak of the pre-pathological states, those before actual disease changes have taken place. We may well speak of pre-symptomatic states, in relation to the eye, as conditions prior to actual disease manifestations, pain, or disturbances of function, which show up very clearly to the expert in the course of a thorough eye examination. Just to take an example, there is a "blind spot" in every human eye, but as the blind spots in the two eyes do not correspond, one eye makes up for the other. Now, enlargement of the blind spot is an indication of a number of disease conditions which, at least at first, do not affect sight, but which, if neglected not only destroy sight but general health as well. The examination of the interior of the eye gives valuable information as to arterial pressure, the condition of the heart and vessels, even of the state of the blood itself. Examination of the eyes and all of their functions will often reveal the unsuspected cause of sleeplessness, poor salesmanship, bad temper, absent-mindedness, lack of energy, in an optical defect or refraction error, which can be completely corrected by glasses, while such common symptoms as headache and dizziness, nausea and "sour stomach," chronic indigestion and constipation, flatulence and stomach cramps often point to an ocular source of trouble. It is by no means general that such obvious things as red lips, itching or burning of the eyes, rapid tiring with reading or writing, movie or theater headaches point unmistakably, and one might almost say exclu-

sively, to the eyes as trouble makers. The routine and repeated eye survey is especially important in school children and in those engaged with short range work. This survey should include not only the eye of the worker, but the work itself and the light in which it is done. Good sight and good light should go together. Finally the periodic eye survey would afford the examining physician a very fine opportunity for a heart to heart talk on conservation of vision and eye health, prevention of injuries, and possibly a word or two about first aid and what not to do.

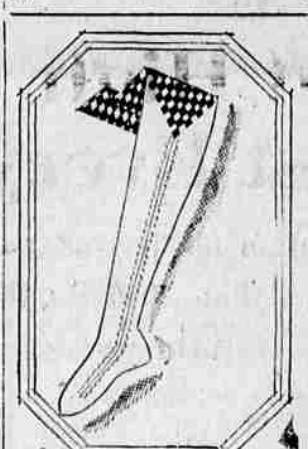

English Lovers Pictured In Film at Star

"Beyond London's Lights," an PRO production which opens tomorrow at the Star theater, gives a clearer and more genuine picture of English life than any heretofore exhibited here. Its characters and setting are real and free from the ordinary monocoed humbug which generally marks screenland's interpretation of our neighbors across the Atlantic.

J. J. Bell's novel, "Kitty Cartwright," forms the basis of the picture. It is the story of a young country lass of the lower middle class who loves and is loved by a scion of the landed gentry. Through the machinations of an ambitious mother, the young man's attention is diverted to a beautiful and wealthy heiress and he forgets his first love, who runs away to London. There she is befriended by a warmhearted artist, who helps her to reconcile her with her old lover, all the while loving her himself. When she is attacked in her room by a rejected suitor, her first lover's chauffeur, she finds, however, that the name of the artist is the first to come to her lips in a plea for help. Realizing that he is the man she really loves, she puts aside her old romance and accepts his offer of marriage.

The picture is replete with tense dramatic situations, and the suspense is carried through until the final fade-out. The background is both beautiful and authentic and is a credit to the director, Tom Terris. The cast includes Lee Shumway, Adrienne Baro, Gordon Elliott, Jacqueline Gadsdon, Herbert Evans, Florence Wis, Templar Saxe, Harriet Craig and Katherine Ward.

Douglas Fairbanks Coming To Arcade Thursday

Douglas Fairbanks again "rang the bell" with his new United Artists production, Douglas Fairbanks as "The Gaucho," which opens Thursday at the Arcade theater. Romance, tense action, originality of treatment and captivating humor characterize this story of the South American border.

The star appears as a Italian hood of the pampas, the dauntless captain of a band of outlaw riders, who captures a beautiful shrine city under the nose of the usurper's troops. The Fairbanks of old is in a freshly entrancing setting and he plays with the bravado and whimsical ardor suitable to the clime and its emotional people.

From beginning to end "Douglas Fairbanks as 'The Gaucho'" holds its audience. The mystery of the shrine, the sowering peaks, the battles of the Gauchos, the grim odds which face the hero and the lure of gold and fair women are powerful elements for screen success.

Lupe Velez, as the wild "girl of the mountains," appears in a dominating contrast to the "girl of the

miracle," played by Eve Southern, whose spiritual power over the Gaucho leader evokes the jealousy of the other; Doug is betrayed into the hands of the usurper, but the repentant madcap brings the dusky horde of plainsmen to his rescue. The aged padre and the shrine girl are saved from the scaffold, while vast herds of steers, stampeded by the wily Gaucho, rout the usurper's forces from the city.

Called sometimes a Canadian lynx, strayed into the outskirts of Minneapolis and was shot by Subert Barker, 37. It was 57 inches long and 23 inches tall.

New stunts by Doug contribute to his adventures. Riding, leaping and holas throwing are achieved with customary skill. The presence of two heroines affords much interest to the narrative, and until the very end of the picture it remains uncertain whether the miracle girl or the mountain girl will be his choice.

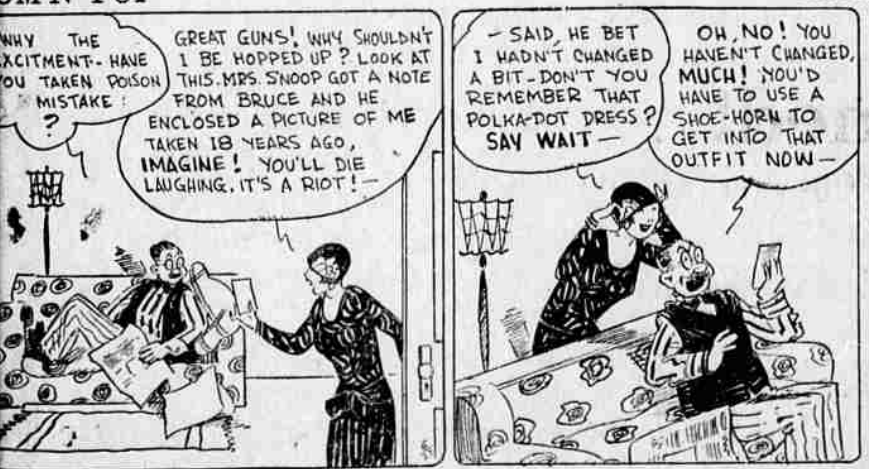
