BERRY SEASON IS NEARING THE END

Prices Down to \$2 to \$2.25 a Crate—Egg Price Drops Expected

PORTLAND, Ore., June 27 (AP)—Strawberries are nearing the end of the season and prices were down today at \$2 to \$2.25 a crate. Current prices were about in the middle of the season and prices show a wide range at \$1.75 to \$2.25 per crate, depending on quality. Other classes of berries were about steady.

Except for a 1/2 cent advance in the quotation of cube first butter for 40c per pound, no changes in butter and egg prices were noticeable today. Although a trifling easier undertone prevailed in the egg division, price drops were looked for today. Yesterday's receipts were: Butter 16,525 pounds; eggs, 1,954 cases. Storage holdings: Butter, 588,374 pounds; eggs, 79,455 cases. Country dressed meats and poultry were steady and unchanged at yesterday's figures with trading fairly active.

Students Destroy Louvain Balustrade

LOUVAIN, Belgium, June 27 (AP)—Despite the presence of four policemen, 200 Louvain students and civilians, demonstrating in favor of the American artist, Whitely Warren, invaded the new library works today and shattered to pieces the pillars of a balustrade which Doctor Ladegue desired to have erected instead of the architect's.

Gendarmes went on guard at the approaches to the library in order to prevent further trouble, particularly since there is much open enmity in Louvain of Mr. Warren's position against that of the rector.

Mr. Warren has held out strongly for the original inscription reading, in part, "Destroyed by German fury," while the rector and those who support him have contended that this would serve merely to revive war hatred.

LARGEST BOATHOUSE

NEWTON, Mass.—Harold Young of Andover, on the Charles river, claims the largest livery canoe house in the world. He has 400 canoes for rent and his sheds house 250 private craft.

Along the mountain range, crops in all sections of the county are greatly in need of rain. The winter wheat crops have stood the dry weather remarkably but are beginning to show some signs of suffering from lack of moisture.

Spring grain on both dry farms and irrigated areas is coming up poorly. Indications are that crops of all kinds will be considerably below that of last year. Practically all of the first crops of hay in the valley sections are reported to be very short. Some cutting has been done during the past week or so, and it is expected that much of the remaining hay will be cut soon after the 15th of July. Pasture and range conditions are being considerably affected by the dry weather and unless much rain falls during the next few weeks, later summer and fall range in most of the country will be poor.

Call Money Rate Is Highest Since On June 7, 1921

NEW YORK, June 27 (AP)—Marking up of the call money rate to 7 1/2%, the highest since June 7, 1921, checked a break upturn in today's stock market. Early gains of 1 to 4 points in the standard rails and industrials and 5 to 12 points in a few specialties were cut down, but prices generally held above the closing quotations of yesterday. Trading was on a slightly broader scale than yesterday up until the time the high money rate went into effect.

The closing was strong. Selling on the high money rates was so well absorbed that shorts became frightened in late dealings and bought back their stocks hurriedly, causing material advances of industrials like U. S. Steel, Radio, and General Motors, the last mentioned touching 130. Total sales approximated 2,000,000 shares.
