PLUMS, BERRIES ON MARKET HERE

New Transparent Apples Offered at 3 Pounds for a Quarter

Several changes in local markets have been chalked up in the last few days.

New arrivals include: Loganberries, selling at two boxes for 25 cents; plums, at 50 cents a basket; and yellow transparent apples, three pounds for a quarter. Cane sugar, quoted at \$7.14 last week, increased in price to \$7.29. Eggs are quoted at 20 cents a dozen.

New potatoes are listed at three cents, green peas at 10 cents, new Texas cabbage at four cents, string beans at 15 cents, turnips at five cents a bunch and celery at 20 cents.

Raspberries are down to two boxes for 25 cents.

Wheat Lower And Easy At Closing

CHICAGO, June 23 (AP)—Opening 1/2c off to 1/4c up, wheat later underwent a material setback all around. Corn, oats and provisions developed firmness, with corn starting at 1/2c to 3/4c advance and later scoring additional gains.

Wheat closed easy, 3/4c to 1c net lower, corn varying from 1/4c decline to 1/2c advance, oats 1/4c to 1/2c off to 1/4c up, and provisions at 5c setback to a rise of 17c.

HARMONY AND AL SMITH IS THE PROGRAM

went into the platform without a roll call.

Moody, Ritchie Satisfied
Governor Dan Moody of Texas, a member of the platform committee, told the convention he would have preferred a direct endorsement of prohibition as a policy but in the interest of harmony would not even submit a minority report.

Governor Ritchie of Maryland, countered that for his part he was willing to take the committee plank even though he preferred local option to federal prohibition. Senator Glass of Virginia, a dry leader and author of the plank, pointed out that it was so worded that the party nominee would have to be bound by it regardless of his personal beliefs. Then in less time than it takes to tell it, the committee report was adopted with a crushing chorus of approval and only a few scattered "noes."

The only other part of the democratic declaration of principles to make serious trouble in committee was the farm plank. As finally brought in and adopted, it pledges the party to take immediate and effective steps to deal with the problem of farm surpluses and the rehabilitation of agriculture generally. Some party leaders believe that Governor Smith will make a more detailed announcement on this subject early in the campaign.

Long Program

A long program of nominating and endorsing speeches preceded consideration of the convention floor and even after the platform was approved and the nomination was made to the tune of a long and loud demonstration, the convention stayed on until well after midnight having expatriated to battle. Besides Senator Reed, John W. Davis, the party nominee four years ago, was brought to the convention platform. He told the cheering delegates that the call of the party in 1923 was harmony under the leadership of Smith.

In the final tabulation of the vote by which the New York group was chosen, only five states appeared as having failed to give the leader at least a part of their support, and one of them was Reed's own state of Missouri, which was block-

ed by convention rules when it sought to turn the band wagon movement to Smith into a nomination by acclamation. Others were Florida, Georgia, South Carolina and Texas—representing the remnants of what the anti-Smith leaders had once hoped to build into a bone dry and anti-Tammany plank against the nomination of the governor.

Ohio Switches

It was really Ohio that consummated the nomination. When the first call of the roll had been completed, Smith's total stood at 724 2-3 or nine short of the number needed to nominate. But having paid their tribute to their respective favorite sons, a half dozen states were ready to change their votes and get aboard the band wagon. For several minutes a presidential nomination hung in the air while delegates from the hall tried to shout each down in their rival attempts to be first to switch to Smith. Chairman Meker, of Ohio, standing on his chair in the right center of the delegates' section, went out and east for the New York governor 44 votes where he had but one on the initial roll call.
Mississippi, Indiana, Nebraska, Kansas and Tennessee quickly followed giving Smith the longer needed, and reducing the anti-Smith votes but 250 of the convention's total strength of 1100 delegates.
