Tripe Roll
One pound tripe, 3 potatoes, 2 teaspoons minced onion, 1 cup soft bread crumbs, 2 tablespoons minced green pepper, 3 slices bacon, 3/4 teaspoon pepper.

Wash tripe through three waters. Drain and cool. In the meantime, boil, mash and season potatoes. Combine with onion, pepper, crumbs and green pepper. Lay tripe flat on a board and spread with potato mixture. Roll firmly and tie securely with string. Roll in flour, brush over with salad oil and place on a rack in a roaster. Cover top with bacon slices and bake for an hour in a hot oven.

When ready to serve, remove string and pour over a well seasoned hot tomato sauce. Cut in slices for serving.
