Bridge Pointers

Continuing the subject of pre-empting bids, it is important that the student of the game should understand that they are not limited to original bids. It is pre-empting, however, to overcall a bid made by his partner or an opponent, or jump a bid made by partner. By "jump" is meant raising the size of the partner's bid, the intervening adversary having passed.

Examples of the above would be:

1. South, One Heart; West, three Spades.
2. South, one Heart; West, pass; North, Three Spades.
3. South, one Heart; West, pass; North, three Hearts.
4. South, one No Trump; West, pass; North, two No Trumps.

Pre-empting after an adverse bid (see example No. 1 above) is not nearly as apt to be effective as pre-empting originally. When one adversary has told his story, the other, in pre-emption does not shut that in-North of a desire to keep him from bidding and it is apt to have the opposite effect, as North knows that South has the strength for an initial bid. It cannot be said that pre-emption after an adverse bid is never advisable, but it safely can be said that it is not apt to be effective unless it be carried to a dangerous extreme.

The type of pre-emption shown by No. 2 is not subject to the objection which applies in the case of No. 1. It is very apt to shut out East, as West's pass of South's bid of one has shown weakness; but South's bid has shown strength in at least one suit and, with great strength in the pre-empting hand in at least one other suit, the overbid may not be necessary.

The pre-emption illustrated by No. 3 is often valuable as a shut-out of the Fourth Hand and is recognized as a sound and standard bidding tactic. A jump of this kind is advisable with a hand that contains length with or without strength in the suit named by the partner, strength in some other suit and shortness and weakness in a Major. For example, supposing South (Dealer) to have bid one Heart and West (Second Hand) to pass, the following North hand would justify a bid of three Hearts:

♠ X
♥ 10-X-X
♦ A-X-X
♣ X-X-X

Illustration No. 4 shows a very important Bridge declaration—so important that it deserves special consideration. It will be discussed next Monday.
