THREE PERSONS KILLED IN STORM

Property and Crop Damage in Four States Estimated at \$500,000
ST. PAUL, Minn., July 2 (AP)—At least three persons were killed and a dozen injured and property and crop damage estimated at \$500,000 was caused by a series of storms and small tornadoes that struck in four northwest states last night and early today.
Minnesota, North and South Dakota and Wisconsin were visited by the wind, hail and rain storms, which developed into tornadoes as Anokita, Minn., and Clear Lake, where they caused damage estimated at \$150,000.
The dead are: Miss Grace Halliday, 27, Aberdeen, killed when her automobile overturned while she was attempting to beat the storm to Wheatland, N. D.
Mrs. Herman Bjorke, Lake Park, Minn., killed when a barn collapsed.
Lewis Kane, 17, Fergus Falls, struck by lightning.

America Out Of Balloon Trophy Race; Bag Falls

DETROIT, Mich., July 2 (AP)—The race for the James Gordon Bennett international balloon trophy was narrowed today to France and Germany. Karl Betts, the official scorer for the race announced following receipt of a message that the U. S. army bag had landed at 12:20 p. m. at Kenbridge, Va.
The only balloon not reported landed and believed still aloft late today was the German entry, Munster.

Avery Hopwood Drowned in Sea Off Nice, France

NICE, France, July 2 (AP)—Avery Hopwood, American playwright, was drowned within sight of life savers and while the crowd on the beach walked last night at Juan Les Pins on the French riviera.
Hopwood, apparently in good health, went swimming at 8 o'clock noon after dinner. He collapsed when far from the shore and drowned before help could reach him.
Graduating from the University of Michigan in 1905, Hopwood went to New York as special correspondent for the Cleveland leader and almost immediately sold his play 'Clothes' written in collaboration with Channing Pollock and produced in 1906. He was 24 years old at the time, having been born in Cleveland in 1882.
His best known plays were 'Fair and Warmer', 'The Gold Diggers' and 'The Rat' written in collaboration with Mary Roberts Rinehart. 'The Rat' was one of the biggest money makers ever staged.

(Continued from Page 1) hand, one each in Detroit, St. Louis and in Denver and the rest in border states with one possible appearance in a west coast city.
The 15 speeches will be different, but they will be alike in that they will deal with easy-understandable problems stated so that they are understandable and appealing to the multitude. Foreign affairs and other matters which do not as a rule directly touch the life of the 'common man' will be passed over as not good campaign material.
Smith's Gift
Smith supporters feel that the governor has the gift of making people who have never seen him and who know nothing of his political policies except in relation to one or two outstanding matters 'think they know him.'
The governor's first speech since his nomination will be at the Tammany societies Fourth of July celebration.
Advertisements in New York newspapers announced that 'patriotic speeches' will be delivered by the governor and Senators Cooper and Wagner. All cities of the United States and lovers of Americanism are invited.
The speeches are to be broadcast.
Invited By Klan
The Ku Klux Klan has invited the governor to address a gathering of 25,000 members of Queens on the evening of Independence day. A telegram guaranteed the governor and friends 'absolute safety' and gave as the reason for the invitation 'the sincere desire of the leaders and members of the Ku Klux Klan to know you more intimately, to see you personally and to hear your presentation of the great issues of the present presidential campaign.'
Smith circles were much interested today in the appeal of Josephus Daniels to southern demagogues to support Governor Smith, but to stand in congress like a stone wall against any recommendation that Smith as president would make to modify the prohibition enforcement act.

Religious Rioting At Khargpur, India

CALCUTTA, India, July 2 (AP)—Newspaper advices says that 18 persons have been killed and 25 seriously wounded in religious rioting at Khargpur, Hindus and Sikhs attacked a Mohammedan religious procession which was playing music when it attempted to pass a Hindu temple. Most of the death occurred in fighting in the byways, grilles and houses where police were unable to separate the combatants. Two women were stabbed to death when they tried to save the lives of relatives.
