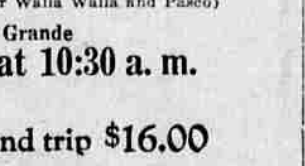

TILDEN DEFEATS BOROTRA TODAY

Henri Cochet Eliminates John Hennessey at Wimbledon Play

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 2 (AP)—William T. Tilden, American tennis ace, advanced to semi-final round of the Wimbledon today by defeating Jean Borotra of the French team by scores of 8-6, 3-6, 6-3, 6-2.

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 2 (AP)—Henri Cochet, sharp shooting French Musketeer advanced to the semi-finals today in defense of the Wimbledon's men's singles by conquering the young American

tennis star, John Hennessey in four sets, 6-4, 6-1, 5-7, 6-2. Cochet's victory over Hennessey turned the tables and gave the Frenchman revenge for his set back at the hands of the American in the United States championships at Forest Hills last September.

LaCoste Wins. Rene LaCoste, French star, defeated Baron H. L. De Morpurgo ace of the Italian Davis cup team, in straight sets, 6-2, 6-3, 6-4, to enter their semi-final round.

The Frenchman got away to a fast start, taking the first game of series from Tilden. It was a session of flashing shots.

Tilden, serving, won the second game although Borotra got the first game. Flashing out with his famous cannon ball service, the

American took the deciding point of the game with a sizzling ace. Frenchman Takes Lead. The colorful Borotra in his black suit was on his toes bounding like a panther after Tilden's fierce drives.

Borotra tried to give Tilden a point on a ball apparently called incorrectly by a linesman, but Tilden would not take it.
