TILDEN DEFEATS BOROTRA TODAY

Henri Cochet Eliminates John Hennessey at Wimbledon Play

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 2 (AP)—William T. Tilden, American tennis ace, advanced to semi-final round of the Wimbledon today by defeating Jean Borotra of the French team by scores of 8-6, 3-6, 6-2, 6-2.

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 2 (AP)—Henri Cochet, sharp shooting French Musketeer advanced to the semi-finals today in defense of the Wimbledon's men's singles by conquering the young American

tennis star, John Hennessey in four sets, 6-4, 6-1, 5-7, 6-2. Cochet's victory over Hennessey turned the tables and gave the Frenchman revenge for his set back at the hands of the American in the United States championships at Forest Hills last September. It also assured France of three of the four of the semi-final brackets.

LaCoste Wins. Rene LaCoste, French star, defeated Baron H. L. De Morpurgo ace of the Italian Davis cup team, in straight sets, 6-2, 6-3, 6-4, to enter their semi-final round. Twelve thousands fans packed the standards around the center courts as Big Bill Tilden and Jean Borotra began their match.

Tilden serving, won the second game although Borotra got the first place, slushing out with his famous cannon ball service, the American took the deciding point of the game with a sizzling ace.

Frenchman Takes Lead. The colorful Borotra, in his black suit was on his toes bounding like a panther after Tilden's fierce drives. Games followed service until they stood at 3-2 with Borotra leading. He then broke through the American's delivery to lead by four games to two.
