## AT THE THEATERS

### "Street of Sin" Pictures London Slums

Emil Jannings has proved again that art need not be beautiful. And he has shown also that realism, stark and powerful, is his forte on the screen, realism with a grim, human quality that burns into the mind.

This time it is "The Street of Sin," more than a worthy successor to his first American production "The Way of All Flesh," which created a place for the tragic screen drama in a land given over to happy endings.

To appreciate the heart shock, the fine irony and the pathos of this Paramount picture, go to see it at the Arcade theater, where it opened yesterday to a reception seldom accorded any star's work.

Jannings stalks through the rubble of the London slums like a conqueror in corduroy. The streets of Limehouse obey the threat of his fists and women love him despite his brutality.

It is essentially a story of regeneration, but wrought differently than ever before on the screen. His reformation, brought about by Fay Wray, who plays a Salvation Army lass is vivid because it is truthful. His purpose in "playing good" is dire in the beginning. His friend, Olga Baklanova, has lost her street girl charm for him and she desires the purity of Fay Wray. He goes to an extreme that causes Miss Wray to go to the verge of death at the moment when he realizes his love for her and her love for him.

Miss Wray and Madame Baklanova, the latter a celebrated Russian from the Moscow Art Theater, give splendid performances. Maurice Miller directed the picture from a story written by Josef von Sternberg and Benjamin Glazer, bearing the heart of squalid Limehouse.

### Boyd As a Riveter In "Skyscraper"

Jobless steel workers, earning their "cakes and coffee" in the motion picture extra ranks during the dull season, played at their profession on familiar ground at the De Mille studio during the filming of "Skyscraper." William Boyd's new star picture production which starts today at the Colonial.

The gigantic steel structure, erected at the Culver City studio for the purpose of making this comedy-drama was originally constructed by the crew of experienced building

hands who later were engaged to re-enact this work in the picture scenes.

The spectacle of hundreds of men sprinkled among the mass of iron girders in a skeleton 13-story skyscraper lends special interest to this photoplay centered around the antics of a pair of "hard-boiled" riveters.
