MARKET RECEIPTS LIGHT THIS WEEK

Prices Generally Steady with the Exception of Tomatoes

PORTLAND, Ore., July 7 (AP)—Local market receipts have been light for the past week. The market remains steady on practically every line with the exception of tomatoes which have temporary condition of being badly overstocked.

Limited receipts of green peppers arrived today, selling at 18c to 27c a pound.

There are increasingly liberal receipts of apricots from the Dalles and Columbia river districts quoted at \$1.15 for 15-pound lots and \$1.95 for 30-pound lots.

ORIGON CELERY is offered at a wide range from 75c to \$1.75.

Alexander peaches from Southern Oregon are coming in quoted at \$1.25 to \$1.75 per box.

Corn was quoted at \$1 a dozen.

PORTLAND LIVESTOCK
PORTLAND, Ore., July 7 (AP)—Receipts total for week: Cattle 2150; Hogs 4000; Calves 310; Sheep 5850.

Cattle compared with a week ago were of more matured quality. Good steers brought \$11.25 to \$11.75; slaughter steers \$10.50 to \$11; considerable showing in feeder (feet) at \$24 to \$25; strictly good cows and heifers absent; a few fairly good heifers at \$10; a few cows at \$8.75 down; calves \$10 down; heavies and thin \$7 and under.

Hogs compared with a week ago: Showed better killing classes. Light butchers \$12.50 to \$11.50; several loads go to shippers Monday at \$12; overweight and underweight \$10.75 down; slaughter weight mostly \$10.25 to \$10.50; few feeder pigs Monday at \$9.75.

Sheep and lambs nominally busy compared with a week ago. Considerable number of good to strict choice forced to arrive at \$13.50. Mostly \$11 to \$12 for variable offerings. Few yearlings at \$7.50 to \$8.

CHICAGO, July 7 (AP)—Hogs—4000; market mostly steady; top \$11.50 and for choice around \$29 (lb.); shippers 5000; estimated hold-over 20. Butchers, medium to choice, 250-350 lbs., \$11.10 to \$11.65. Cattle—500; compared with a week ago: Grain fed steers and yearlings \$8 to \$11 higher. Better grade weaners steady; in-lots, mostly \$11.50 to \$12.50; several top animals. Yearlings \$11 up; extreme top weight fed steers \$15.50; yearlings \$14.50; odd lots all representative weights \$16. Light weaners \$15.25 to \$16; shipper kinds \$16 to \$16.50; stockers and feeders \$10.25 to \$11.75.

Sheep—Receipts 250; odd flocks; natives steady; for the week 75 doubles from feeding stations; 11,000 direct. Fat lambs closing 50 to 75c higher, quality and sorts considered. Sheep and feeding lambs unchanged. Week's top prices: Fat rangers \$14.35; fat natives \$14.75; yearlings \$14.35; fat ewes \$7; range feeding lambs \$12.75 to \$13.25.

OREGON TO SEND 50
SALISBURY, Ore., July 7 (AP)—At the convention of the national tax association to be held in Seattle August 27 Oregon will be represented by about 50 persons who have been appointed by Governor Patterson to attend. The appointments were made at the request of Governor Hartley of Washington. Assessors of the various counties and other citizens, many of them members of the legislature, make up the personnel of the group.

Horah, Padlock and Tom Sharkey, Dayton (Ohio) star, each triumphant in identical time of 21 2-5 seconds, a fifth second faster than the Olympic record.

Padlock, making his last effort to land a berth on the team, won the most spectacular heat when he beat Henry Loeck, famous Norwegian, and world's 200-yard record holder as well as Claude Bracey, a Texas ace, who was shut out of the finals as a result of finishing third.

Horah easily beat Scholz in the first heat while Sharkey out-footed Henry Cummings in the other. The Toledo school boy, Don Bennett, finished fourth and was eliminated along with Russell Sweet, of San Francisco, and Aubrey Cochrill, Texas, representing the headlight A. C. of St. Louis.

Conger Wins 1500 Race
After being pocketed and apparently hopelessly in the rear, Ray Conger, a slim Iowa runner, representing I. A. C. uncocked a tremendous finish to win the final 1500 meter tryout and shatter the American record. It took the tape in 2:59 to clip 4 seconds from the mark made here four years ago by Abel Kaviet.

Rufus Kiser, of Washington, was well up with the leaders until the last 100 meters but he cracked and finished seventh, in bad shape.

12:15, near Cape July, the weather became more favorable and we descended from the clouds and recognized the coast which we followed to Villa Cisneros and directly on to Cape San Rocco.

"During the night we rose gradually to 2500 meters in order to get above cloud banks, but were not successful.

"From 11 o'clock at night until 2 o'clock in the morning we were obliged to navigate long stretches amidst the clouds.

"Near the equator, the sky was serene. At 3 p. m. flying 4000 meters up, we saw the American coast which was immediately lost to view below us and we proceeded, steering by compass for Bahal. At 4:20 p. m. on account of the low clouds, the bad weather and the impossibility of descending to study the coast, we decided to return northward where we had left behind clear weather, to make a landing at Port Natal. We succeeded in descending near the Musoro river and followed the coast at lowest level to Port Natal."

"On account of the low clouds at a low flying level, the hills around and the poor visibility because of rain we did not succeed in finding the field which was 23 kilometers southwest of Natal behind hills. In view of the approaching exhaustion of our gasoline supply we decided to return north where we had observed a zone favorable to an emergency landing.

"Near the village of Tauros, the gasoline pressure gave out unexpectedly while we were flying under clouds at a height of 100 meters and we were obliged to land carefully on a beach of sandy soil. After a few meters of rolling, the wheels sank in the soft sand causing damage to the chassis.

"During the whole flight the functioning of the motor and the behavior of the plane and the various installations aboard were perfect."
