tions of the Imbler district he attached to the Indian Creek district. This petition was not completely made out or signed and final consideration was not given it. The other petition asked that 20 sections from the Imbler district be attached to the Hindman district. The board settled this on compromise by giving the Hindman district 12 sections leaving eight of the sections in the Imbler district. A petition came from Palmer Junction asking that part of the territory be attached to the Fairview district. This was put over until the next meeting for investigation. A petition presented by A. J. Coe and others asked for a new school district to be drawn from parts of Lower Coe, Adel and Imbler, met with a refusal by the board members who contended that it was not feasible. Medical Springs asked for three sections from a disorganized territory between Medical Springs and the forest reserve. This was granted.

The board met at 2 o'clock. Auditing of bills occupied the major share of the two-day session. The widow's pension was approved and approval of the monthly county treasurer's report was given an O. K. One interesting record on the court docket reports a petition filed by Eric S. Williams asking for a refund of his taxes. This petition was carried over from the June term and yesterday was again held over, awaiting a report from the county assessor.

DEATH STORY NO HOAX, ARMEN SAY

LONDON, July 7 (AP)—Captain Drew, pilot of Captain Alfred Lowenstein's private airplane, returned to Croydon today after a fruitless search in the English channel for the financier's body and emphatically denied rumors that the captain's disappearance was a gigantic hoax. "It's all utter rubbish," he declared. "There is absolutely no truth in the rumor that he did not enter the plane, or that he left it on the French coast. It would have been impossible for him to leave the machine after we landed without noticed. I don't think for a moment either that it was a case of suicide."

UNION, Ore. (Special)—Funeral services for Ira A. Dennison were held here Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock at Cook Brothers' chapel with the Rev. Robert C. Lee of the Methodist church in charge. Burial was in the Union cemetery. Mr. Dennison, who passed away at Hot Lake Tuesday following a paralytic stroke, was born at Lancaster, Wis., Oct. 21, 1861. At the age of 16 he went with his parents to Kansas, later settling in Wyoming and going from there to Montana. On Dec. 2, 1895 he was united in marriage to Anna M. Record, of Tacoma, Wash., and moved to Union, where they have since resided. At the time of his death he was 66 years of age. Besides his widow, he is survived in one daughter, Mrs. Jake Wilkinson, of Union, four step-children, two sisters, and one brother, John Dennison, of Springfield, Utah.
