It was a strangely modern death that overtook Capt. Alfred Loewenstein, the big Belgian financier who recently toured this country in an airplane. Flying across the English Channel on a business trip, it is believed that he opened the wrong door of the cabin and stepped out into empty air. That, naturally, was the last of Loewenstein.

It was like the more familiar mistake of walking through an elevator door and dropping to the basement, only worse.

Evidently there will have to be more automatic safety devices in airplanes, before they are completely safe for passengers. The motto of modern transportation, "Watch Your Step," taken on new importance.

It's a good thing, too. Here's at least one realm in which it cannot be denied that the present generation is making progress. It has long been too dull a world. Color means life, brightness, cheerfulness, health, vigor and—when taste has advanced a little—a whole new world of esthetic enjoyment. The next generation won't be so dumb artistically. We see no reason why a pink-enameled range won't cook just as well as a dirty black one, or a lavender bath tub hold water quite as efficiently as the white kind. We have a deep suspicion that the color is added in most things for lack of a more potent selling attraction, but what does that matter?

La Grande Air Field Personals

LA GRANDE AIRFIELD (Special)—Pilot David Linemack, who was flying a new three-passenger Air King ship from Lomax, Ill., to Eugene, Ore., landed in the Tom Sherwood hay meadow late on the evening of the third and left for his destination the next day. Pilot Linemack stated that as it was necessary for him to make a landing for the night, upon investigation here looked just right to him—the government emergency field looked too full of water puddles and the La Grande air field looked too small. After circling about in quest of a better place, he finally spied what looked to him from his seat in the air, a fine, smooth boulevard—just what he was looking for. Just the landing for him! So much better than those ordinary landing airways! New Lowenstein Story Is Told

LONDON, July 9 (AP)—The Exchange Telegraph company prints a startling dispatch from Dunkirk which gives a new theory on the disappearance of Captain Alfred Lowenstein, Belgian financier. A fisherman of the village of Bray Dunes on the French coast, says the dispatch is reported to have stated he was certain he saw a parachute fall about the time the Lowenstein plane was crossing the English channel and alight a few miles from where he was.

He did not bother to investigate as he saw a boat near where the parachute came down.

There is no confirmation of this report but in aviation circles it is asserted that provided the plane door was open it would have been possible for Lowenstein to leave the airplane without being detected by the crew.

Howard Elliott, Rail Executive, Called Beyond

DENNIS, Mass., July 9 (AP)—Howard Elliott, noted railroad executive, whose success in establishing public confidence contributed largely to the prosperity of three great lines is dead.

The former president of the Northern Pacific and New York, New Haven and Hartford railroads and vice president of the Burlington, succumbed late last night to an attack of heart disease at the Cape Cod summer home of his daughter Mrs. Frederick Wilson.

Under his guidance the Northern Pacific regained good will to the extent that under his regime it doubled its capacity and business. He made such a record that his services were obtained by the New Haven railroad and as president he was credited with rehabilitating it.

He started railroading while still a student at Harvard when he accepted a job as a rodman in a survey crew. His rise was rapid. He was born in New York on December 6, 1869.

In addition to his many other achievements, Mr. Elliott was president of the board of overseers of Harvard university.
