Comedy Drama Has New Setting In "Don't Marry"

Something entirely new in comedy-drama was seen last night in Fox Films "Don't Marry," which opened at the Sun theater for a two-day run. It is a story built on a theme of romance with Lois Moran and Neil Hamilton making an ideal team under direction of James Tinling.

Primarily it is a story of a modern girl who wants to throw off the shackles of her mid-Victorian-minded aunt, but who, in doing so, falls in love with a puritanical young man who almost changes her entire viewpoint on life.

Miss Moran, cast as Priscilla Bowen, gives an excellent performance in the dual role of a flapper who turns old-fashioned to win her man, and who then has to revert to type to hold him. Miss Moran not only handles the humorous situations with finesse and understanding, but brings to the screen two entirely different personalities that hold the interest of her fans.

Throughout the picture, Cast as Henry Willoughby, the young man who thinks he wants to marry an old-fashioned girl but who decidedly changes his mind, Neil Hamilton gives a worthwhile performance that establishes him as an excellent comedian.

The entire production registers 100 per cent in entertainment value from the first reel to the last.

But these days are gone forever as Lon Chaney demonstrates in his newest Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer vehicle, "The Big City," now playing at the Arcade theater. The detective looks like a salesman or insurance agent, and the gangster is a tailored person who looks like a lawyer or doctor.

"The Big City" is an ultra modern romance of gangster life in New York—more the less thrilling because it is based on fact, and the conventional characters of the underworld are conspicuous by their absence. It portrays the gangster chief, played by Chaney, as a modern cook with a cabinet as a cloak for his activities and insurance against being "vagged" on suspicion, and the detective and police men are all modern New York types—far from the usual screen conception.

This is one reason, perhaps, why the story rings so true. Chaney, as the masterful but sinister "Chuck" Collins, has a role that he plays in a unique combination of makeup and histrionic dialogue, and Marceline Day as the little shopgirl, innocently caught in the mazes of one of his plots, is appealingly sweet. James Murray, as the young gangster who attains regeneration through the influence of the girl, plays a difficult role with a well-balanced sense of artistry, while Betty Compson, as the hard-bitten
