PRODUCE PRICES RANGING UPWARD

Butter and Eggs Remain on Level—Fruit, Cheese, Poultry Take Jump

PORTLAND, Ore., July 9 (AP)—The new week opened with a few upward prices in the local market. Butter and egg prices remained level. Potatoes were included for a slight rise with Deschutes gems quoted at \$2.

Cheese prices rose generally about one cent with exception of block Swiss, which fell to 38c. Poultry also rose about one cent on all classes. Heavy hens are quoted today at 23 to 24c and medium weight 17 to 18c.

In country meats choice veals and pork rose one cent per pound. Fruit prices also show slight rises. Raspberries and loganberries and peaches took an upward turn in prices. Plums came down slightly with the advent of increased quantities on the market.

Strawberries are still scarce and likely to remain so, now selling at \$2.25 a crate. First shipment of Bartlett pears arrived today from California, quoted at \$1.75 a half box.

NEW YORK, July 9 (AP)—Cotton prices broke more than \$2.50 a bale today on the cotton exchange when the government report estimating cotton acreage in cultivation showed an increase of 11.4 per cent over last year's.

Certain Shares Head Upward in Closing Trade

NEW YORK, July 9 (AP)—Major speculative activities in today's stock market were again on the upside, but the buying continued selective in character. Early gains of 1 to 3 points were intercepted with several soft spots.

Trading was on a slightly larger scale than last Friday, total sales close to 1,200,000 shares.

The closing was firm. Certain shares managed to head upward in face of a late stiffening in the call rate. International Match preferred gained four points and McCrory Stores B 5 1/2. The list in general was disposed to mark time for a while, some of the leaders appeared to most abundant offerings at their high ranges notably Harvester and the airplane issues also contributed to a mixed movement in final dealing. Total sales approximated 1,700,000 shares.

Finds Man With Wife, Kills Him

DENVER, July 9 (AP)—A. E. (Dick) Dickson, prominent Colorado theater owner, is held in jail here today in connection with the killing of Herbert W. Powell, 13, who he found with his wife at the Dickson home when he arrived unexpectedly. The shooting took place in the kitchen of the Dickson home. Dickson told police that he had turned a fake out-of-town trip, returning a few hours later. In a fight which followed, for the possession of a revolver held by Dickson, two bullets struck Powell, one through the shoulder and one through the head. Powell died almost instantly.
