WASHINGTON, July 10 (AP)—A drop of 20 degrees in temperature to 74 from the maximum reached yesterday brought relief to the national capital today from the heat wave which gripped it for nearly a week. Cooled breezes under a cloudy sky sent the thermometer down to a minimum at 5 o'clock this morning. During the next four hours the mercury slowly climbed three degrees but the cool wind was stronger than that earlier in the day and the prospects were that the day would continue cool.

Volcano Eruption Terrifies People
