Bridge Pointers

The series of playing questions we are running on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of this week apply equally well to Auction Bridge or Contract Bridge. In today's hand South is the Declarer; the contract is No Trump; and the score is love-all (nothing-nothing). The cards of Dummy and Closed Hand are given.

West leads the Deuce of Clubs to the first trick, East plays the Ace of Clubs; what Club should be played by Closed Hand? Make up your mind what you would do before reading the answer given below.

West Leads: ♠ 9-8-7-3, ♣ 6-4-2, ♠ 10-9-8, ♣ 10-9-8

East Plays: ♠ 10-9-8, ♣ 10-9-8

North Dummy: ♠ 10-9-8, ♣ 10-9-8

South: ♠ 10-9-8, ♣ 10-9-8

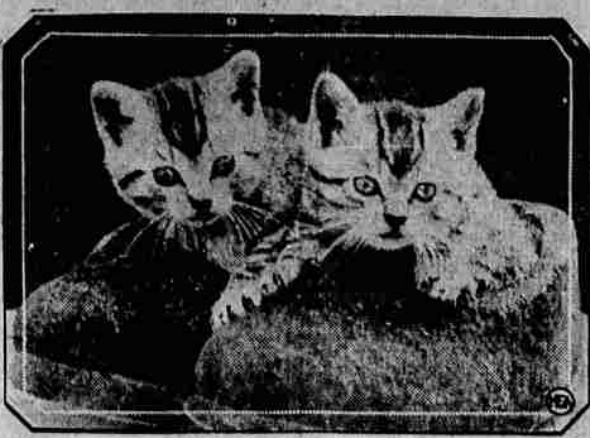
Answer: To trick 1, South (Closed Hand) should play the Queen of Clubs.

Closed Hand plays the Queen of Clubs under the adverse Ace so to make sure that the one Club trick to be won by Declarer will be won in the Dummy hand from which a lead is desired, rather than by South—the hand from which a lead is not desired. Should Closed Hand play the Eight of Clubs on the first trick, East doubtless would return a Club, Closed Hand would have to play the Queen, and very likely West, who has the King, would duck and permit the Queen to win so that Dummy would not be left with a winner. It is to prevent this that South should play the Queen on the first trick.

Declarer will want to lead both Hearts and Diamonds from Dummy toward Closed Hand, and to do that effectively may need two entries in Dummy; and Dummy will have but one sure entry—the King of Spades—If Declarer permit himself to win the second round of Clubs in Closed Hand, it being important to try both Heart and Diamond finesses, two entries in Dummy should be ensured—at no cost.

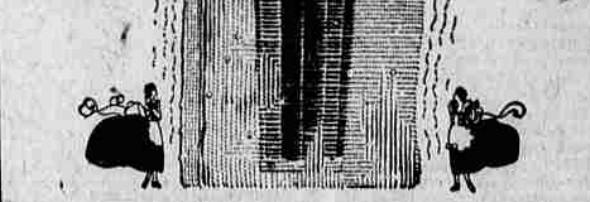
REQUEST PAROLE

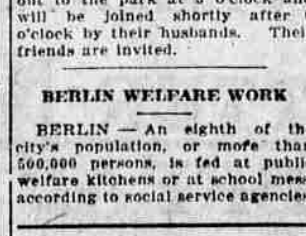
The Ladies' Aid of the Lutheran church will meet with Mrs. John Jones at 1206 Fourth street on Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock.
