SWIFT REACTION
STRIKES STREET

Stiffening Money Rates
Brings About Drop in
Stock Prices

NEW YORK, July 11 (AP)—A
swift reaction in stock prices was
Wall Street's initial response to the
raising of the Chicago federal re-
serve discount rate from 4 1/2 to
5 per cent. Large selling orders
came into the market overnight and
carried prices down \$1 to \$7.50 a
share.

NEW YORK, July 11 (AP)—
Stiffening money rates brought
about another sharp reaction in the
stock market today.

An opening decline of 1 to 7 1/2
points was followed by a rally
when the call money renewal rate
was unchanged at 6 per cent. The
subsequent calling of \$20,000,000 in
bank loans, accompanied by a
tightening of time money and
banker's acceptances brought about
another sinking spell after midday.
The closing was weak. Stocks
were unloaded more freely when
the bulls began to revise calcu-
lations as to plentifulness of money
supplies. Pools seemingly let their
favorites seek their own level with
the result that some early declines

Melon Demand
Increases Due
To Hot Weather

PORTLAND, Ore., July 11 (AP)—
Evidence of an in-between sea-
son on fruits and melons are ap-
parent on the local market, re-
sponsible for the rising price quo-
tations today. Hot weather is ex-
pected to slow down the consump-
tion of meats. Receipts are con-
ting in much slower but there has
been no material change in price.
In eggs, fresh medium extras
rose 1/2 to 3/4c. Fresh medium
firsts also rose to 27c.

Butter prices took a slight rise.
Extras are now 43 1/2c standards
42c, prime firsts 42c and firsts 41c.
The full season for apricots from
The Dalles is expected to com-
mence next week. The total crop
is estimated about 1,000 tons. Or-
chardists report advance sales from
\$1.20 to \$1.25 a ton. Local mar-
ket quotations at present are \$1 to
\$1.25 per 15-pound box and \$1.50
to \$2.25 per 30-pound box.

New red potatoes from The
Dalles are coming in slowly and
getting as high as \$2.50 cwt. Other
better grades of white potatoes
range today from \$1.75 to \$2.25.
