This section has been favored with a number of nice showers of rain during the last week or ten days, which while it has delayed haying operations to some extent is considered very beneficial to many of the crops. The showers have been followed by cool weather allowing the winter wheat crops to fill in good shape. The grain has come along very rapidly recently. With many of the early sowed fields beginning to color considerably, indications are that some cutting of hay will be done during the next week. Spring sown grain is very short yet, and many believe that with the recent moisture much of the grain may be fairly good. Much of the seed which did not germinate at the time of sowing is coming up but this of course will be late. Pasture and range conditions are reported to be in good shape.

Much cutting of hay has been going on during the last few days. Some hay was cut before the 4th, and was wet considerably by several heavy showers of rain, making it necessary to turn part of the shocks. Farmers appear to be experiencing little difficulty in securing plenty of help.

Some plowing of summerfallow is still being done in parts of the county. It is stated that many of the fields are plowing up in better shape than the late rains than at any time this spring.

J. F. Hahn, of Evans, who has been herding his band of sheep on fields on his hill ranches which has not been plowed yet, moved the sheep back to his home ranch near Evans the latter part of the week.

Word reached friends here Monday of the death of Clark F. Harmon at Portland, Monday. Mr. Harmon had been in poor health for the last several months and was taken to the hospital at Walla Walla early in the spring and later taken to Portland. The body was taken to Walla Walla, Wash., where funeral services were held Wednesday. Mr. Harmon has been a resident of the Leap community for the last 10 or 12 years, where he has been farming in partnership with his brother, Asa Harmon. He was about 45 years of age and is survived by his wife and two daughters Verna who has been a student at the University of Oregon for the last two years, and Margaret Harmon, besides many other relatives here and in Eastern Washington.

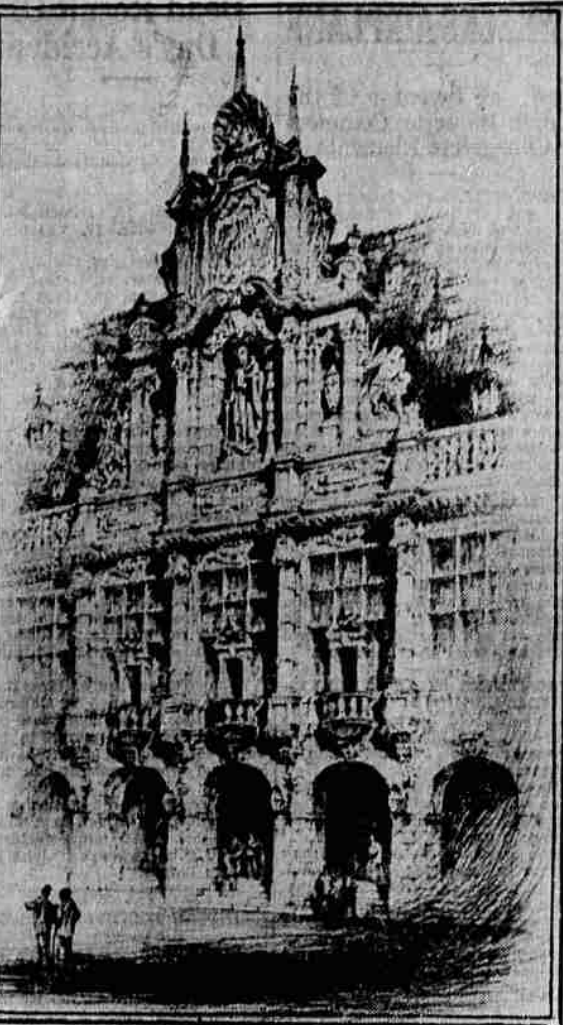

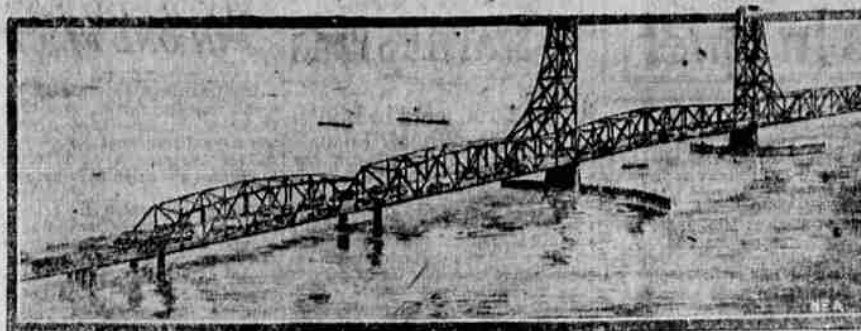
COOLIDGE MISSES TOM TOMS
