## Bridge Pointers

### Contract Bridge

Last week in our series of Contract articles we covered the question of Major suit overcalls of partner's game-going No Trump bid, determining that in any such case as: South three No Trumps, West pass, North four of a Major, that North's bid should show unusual length with probably lower honor-strength in the Major and should not be a slam-indicator. The question for us to consider today is what meaning should be given to the overcall of a partner's game-going No Trump with a Minor suit. When the bidder's side has a score, there is every reason for treating a Minor overcall just as a Major overcall would be treated at love; and therefore in either of the following cases: (a) Dealer's side score 30, South (Dealer) two No Trumps, West pass, North three of a Minor; (b) Dealer's side score 20, South (Dealer) three No Trumps, West pass, North four of a Minor; the meaning of the Minor overcall would be an unusually long Minor Suit and a better prospect of game at the Minor than at No Trump or, in other words, the exact parallel of the Major situation that was explained last week; but when the Dealer's side has no score and the bidding is South (Dealer) three No Trumps, West pass, North four of a Minor, the meaning is different. Then the bid is a slam-indicator.

It is possible but not probable that game (eleven tricks) can be made more readily with a long Minor than nine tricks can be made at No Trumps; on the other hand, it is probable that ten tricks can be made in the Major or in the Minor with a score, more easily than nine can be made at No Trump. Consequently it is possible to use the Minor at a love score as a slam-indicator, and therefore the following bidding and information go together: Score love, South three No Trumps, West pass, North four of a Minor. North announces: "I have a hand which leads me to think that, facing your three No Trumps, a slam is probable and I am giving you that information together with the fact that I have the Ace of the suit I am naming."

Score love, South three No Trumps, West pass, North four No Trumps. North is saying to South: "Opposite your three No Trumps, my hand has distinct slam possibilities if not probabilities. I have not either Minor Ace, so I cannot show my possibilities by bidding four of a Minor; but by jumping your No Trump I am announcing slam possibilities, but not announcing whether or not I have a Major Ace."

## MENUS

**By Sister Mary BREAKFAST**—Orange juice, cereal, cream, baked French toast, sirup, milk, coffee.

**LUNCHEON**—Stuffed peppers, watercress with chiffonade dressing, cream cheese and whole wheat sandwiches, meringue pudding, milk, tea.

**DINNER**—Broiled halibut steaks, lemon butter, scalloped potatoes, diced carrots, cabbage salad, cherry pudding, milk, coffee.

Stuffed peppers offer a suggestion for a bridge luncheon as well as the family meat. They are especially good to serve for a "one-plate" luncheon since the pepper acts as a container.

Four large sweet green peppers, a cup peeled and sliced mushrooms, 2 tablespoons butter, 1½ cups shell peas, ¼ teaspoon salt, ¼ cup cream, ½ cup buttered crumbs.

Cut a slice from the stem end of each pepper and remove seeds and pith. Cover with boiling water, let stand five minutes. Drain and rub off thin coating on outside of peppers. Melt butter, add mushrooms and cook five minutes. Add peas which have been cooked in just enough water to prevent burning until almost done. Add cream, salt and a few grains of pepper.

Fill peppers with this mixture, cover with a thick layer of buttered crumbs and place upright in a buttered baking dish. Pour a little hot water in one side of the dish and bake in a moderately hot oven for 30 minutes. Baste the peppers several times with the water over the peppers and not over the crumbs.
