The negroes, apparently crushed earlier in the night by the nearness and certainty of death, recovered their spirits to a greater degree than the white men before the time came for them to pass down the corridor of steel.

Howard entered the chamber singing "Sweet Lily of the Valley" and, as he sank back in the chair waved his hand saying "Gentlemen, how are you all feeling tonight?"

KELLOGG TREATY IS APPROVED BY GERMAN NATION

(Continued from Page 1) sent simultaneously to 14 nations, including in addition to France and Germany, Great Britain, Japan, and Italy. Germany was the first to reply.

Under the proposed treaty, the signatory nations would "condemn recourse to war" and "renounce it as an instrument of national policy." Further, they would agree to use only pacific means in seeking a settlement of whatever disputes or conflicts might arise between them, regardless of their nature or origin.

PERU APPROVES PROPOSAL—WASHINGTON, July 13 (AP)—The Peruvian note approving Secretary Kellogg's proposal for restoration of diplomatic relations between Peru and Chile reached the state department today, virtually concluding the long drawn negotiations.

The plan for resumption of full diplomatic relations between the two countries is a new step toward solution of the Tacna-Arica territorial dispute which caused a break in relations more than two decades ago. Secretary Kellogg hopes that with the restoration of these relations Chile and Peru between themselves will be able to work out a satisfactory formula as to the ultimate sovereignty of Tacna-Arica.

Publish Notes Tomorrow—Chilean acceptance of this proposal was placed in the Secretary's hands this week by the Chilean ambassador. Both the Peruvian and Chilean notes will be made public by the state department, at which time some expression of gratification from Secretary Kellogg is to be expected.

RUMANIA ACCEPTS—BUCHAREST, July 13 (AP)—Acceptance of Secretary Kellogg's anti-war proposal was announced at a cabinet council today by the foreign minister, M. Titulescu. Acceptance is conditioned on the reservation that the obligations of Rumania toward the league of nations shall not be interfered with.

M. Titulescu added that the other members of the Little Entente and Poland held similar views.

MEXICAN AVIATOR ON NON-STOP TRIP—PORTLAND, July 13 (AP)—Five minutes after the jury had left the federal courtroom here late yesterday to determine the fate of Ted Jackson, Klamath Indian charged with assault with intent to kill, an acquittal was returned and the many tribesmen who came here to attend the trial climbed into their automobiles and left for the reservation.

Jackson was charged with beating his cousin, Jasper Jackson, during a prolonged drinking spree. The cousin died April 23 a few days after the alleged attack. Jackson took the witness stand in his defense and denied any trouble with his relative.

MEXICAN AVIATOR ON NON-STOP TRIP—NEW YORK, July 13 (AP)—No word came back in the Long Island flying field today from Captain Emilio Carranza who slipped away quietly last evening on a non-stop flight to Mexico City.

After the first few storm-marked hours, watchers hardly expected him to return but they were somewhat surprised when 17 hours passed without a report of his being sighted. They pointed out the intention of the Mexican good will flier to follow a compass course

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NEGROES HANGED

JACKSON, Miss., July 13 (AP)—Two negroes were hanged today for murder.

Will Burdo, convicted of the slaying of Clarence O'Neal near Ackee in 1927, was placed on the trap and pronounced dead 12 minutes later.

At Mendenhall, Greene Kirk, sentenced for killing H. W. Hemby and Carl Nunnery, peace officers, went to the gallows at 10:35 and was dead 11 minutes later.

Three Burned In Airplane Plunge—PALACIOS, Texas, July 13 (AP)—Three men were killed here today when a plane in which they were flying crashed from a low altitude and burst into flames on a downtown street.

The dead: Earl Parker, Texas City, pilot; Max Weinberg, Boston; Ralph Green, Galveston.

ATTEMPT MADE TO KILL BELGRADE POLICE CHIEF—BELGRADE, Jugoslavia, July 13 (AP)—An attempt to assassinate Chief of Police Jivodin Lazitch was made in the ministry of the interior today. Lazitch being wounded in the head.

The attempt was made by a man whose identity has not been established who shot himself through the heart. He fired several shots at Lazitch.

Lazitch was reported in a serious condition.

KIDNAPED CHILD FOUND—MIAMI, Fla., July 13 (AP)—Billy McAllister, four years old, who was kidnaped last night from the home of his mother, Mrs. W. J. McAllister, was found today in a Coral Gables vacant house today by persons living next door who heard him pounding on the door of a closet in which he was locked. The child said his kidnapers were a "fat man and a woman."

San Francisco Man Killed At Dallas—DALLAS, Ore., July 13 (AP)—Oscar T. Smith, 46, of San Francisco, was killed and an 11-year-old child of William G. Penby, cook, San Francisco, was perhaps fatally injured near here today when their automobile, driven by the boy's father, crashed into a Southern Electric train. The accident occurred at a grade crossing about four miles north of Rickson, near Hotles Gap.

The dead man was an employee of the American Bank of San Francisco, and wore a special officer's badge.
