Bridge Pointers

Continuing the discussions of cases in which the partner of a No Trump bidder, Second Hand having passed, should jump the bid from one No Trump to two No Trumps, aiming to keep the Fourth Hand from making a bid which would be a lead-director for the Second Hand if the original bidder's side should go back to No Trumps; it was stated last week that examples of such bids would be given today. Two such hands follow:



Both of these hands furnish material support for a partner's No Trump; they contain no other bid which the holder could think of making if the partner's No Trump should be overcalled by the Fourth Hand. In neither case is it probable that raising the partner's No Trump bid to two will put the contract at too high a figure for him to fulfill; and the probability of the partner's making game at No Trump is greatly increased by the jump bid because it is almost sure to keep the Fourth Hand from bidding. To be sure, Fourth Hand may not have a bid, in which case the jump increases the least benefit; but if Fourth Hand should be able to make a bid over one No Trump (it is not likely that he will be strong enough to bid three over two No Trumps), and the No Trump be rebid, it is quite probable that the initial lead of the Fourth Hand's long suit will make the winning of the game far more difficult for the No Trumpster, than would be the case if the Second Hand left without information, should be obliged to open his own long suit in which Fourth Hand may have no strength whatever. Playing against a No Trump, it generally is more advantageous to lead through Dummy toward a long-strong suit in partner's hand, than it is to open a long suit in which partner may be very weak.

The No Trump jump should not be made unless the jumping hand has strength aggregating at least eleven (based on the Ace 4, King 3, Queen 2 and Jack 1 count) divided between at least two suits.

Next Monday we shall consider cases in which a jump should not be made even with the requisite strength.

MENUS

BREAKFAST—Chilled cantaloupe, cereal, cream, crisp bacon, scrambled eggs, toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Cold sliced meat loaf, shredded new cabbage and carrots, apple sauce, ginger bread, milk, tea.

DINNER—Baked sea bass, green peppers stuffed with rice, savory beans, sour cream cherry pie, milk, coffee.

Sour cream cherry pie is a delicious summer dessert. Fresh tart cherries are necessary and freshly soured, thick cream.

Sour Cream Cherry Pie

Pastry—1-3 cups flour, 1/2 teaspoon baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons lard, 4 tablespoons cold water.

Filling—1 1/2 cups pitted cherries, 1 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1 tablespoon flour, 1/2 cup sour cream, few grains salt.

SIGNS FOR VACATIONISTS.

The vacation trial has many signs along it. Some people see them; some do not. The wise man not only stops to read the signs but he follows their directions carefully.

The first sign bears the following caption: "Start the vacation season by having a physical examination by your physician. You have your car examined each year; why not be logical and include an examination for yourself? After all, it is more important that you run right than that your car does."

The second sign bears the following caption: "If you are vacationing in places where you do not know how good the milk and water supplies are, why not protect yourself from possible danger by taking the typhoid vaccine treatments before starting on your trip?"

The third sign bears the caption: "Be careful of the food you eat. Less food is required in summer than in winter. A well-balanced diet includes some hard food such as crusts of bread, some bulky food such as vegetables, and some raw food such as fruit. After you are forty, meat should be eaten sparingly. Eat at regular intervals. Do not eat when you are overfed. Do not eat when irritated. Eat slowly and chew your food well."

The fourth sign states: "Walk a brisk mile or two daily in the open. Walking is one of the best forms of exercise. Walking in the country or over uneven spaces is better for you than walking over smooth sidewalks. Do not exercise immediately before or directly after a meal. Make your exercise a pleasure, not a task."

The fifth sign says: "Eight hours of sleep for adults, ten for children." This is a wise sign to follow. Rest is necessary to regain strength and rebuild the tissues.

Fat Is Dangerous After Age of 30

WASHINGTON (AP)—Up to the age of 30 overweight is likely to add years to life, but after that it has the opposite tendency.

That is one of the conclusions reached by Dr. Francis G. Benedict, director of the Nutrition Laboratory of the Carnegie Institution of Washington, after many years devoted to the study of metabolism, the fundamental vital process involving the combustion of food materials when united with oxygen in the cells.

Grand Prix Shows Revival Of Elegance

PARIS (AP)—The brilliant throng which turned out to see Odeon Mills' Cri de Guerre win the Grand Prix, the official windup of the French social season, lived up to its pre-war traditions.

Favorable weather permitted smart Parisians and fashionable foreigners who spend much of their time in Paris to wear the frothy gowns which they hoped to initiate at the Grand Prix. The mannequins were there in great numbers.

Huge transparent hats and frivolous sunshades lent feminine elegance and contrasted with the rain togs and mannish modes of last year. Plouces, ruffles and abundance of draperies on sheer printed afternoon frocks proclaimed the return of femininity.

Light colors were most evident. Shades of blue covering a wide range, greys, pale yellows, greens and vivid reds enlivened the scene.

English women viewed the races through monocles with tortoise shell rims. One Parisian brought with her as a good luck fetish a live tortoise, painted gold and studded with stones.

There were several all lace dresses and ensembles and apron effects were not uncommon. A beige georgette and lace cape was unusually effective.

One of the most unusual accessories at the Grand Prix was a parasol made of alternate bands of jute, red, beige, white and brown straw. Other parasols were of lace with appliqued handmade ribbon flowers.
