Little Change Evident In Egg, Poultry Market

PORTLAND, Ore., July 16 (AP)—Little change was evident in the egg and poultry market today. Hens from 4 to 4 1/2 pounds rose 1c to a 29c quotation. Springs and leghorns are quoted at 24c. Potatoes dropped slightly. Yellow gems are quoted at \$1.15. Other varieties higher. Deschutes gems, fancy bakers, are quoted at \$2.

Citrus fruits have taken a sharp rise on the local market. California grapefruit is quoted here at \$4.50 and \$5.50. Lemons, \$3.75 to \$5.50. Valencia oranges, \$7 to \$8.50. Cantaloupes are now coming in more plentifully from the Central California district. Prices range from \$2 for flats to \$4.50 in the larger sizes.

Extreme Dullness Hits Wall Street

NEW YORK, July 16 (AP)—Extreme dullness again characterized today's stock market, with the general bid drifting lower on a resumption of selling for both accounts. Standard industrials and rails fell 1 to 5 points as supporting orders were withdrawn, and a few of the high priced specialties broke 5 to 11 points.

The closing was weak. Recoveries of 1 to 10 points were made by several of the speculative leaders after the lowering of the call money rate but selling was resumed on a wider scale in final dealings, many issues touching lows for the day. Radio slumped more than 7 points to 15 1/2.

Total sales approximated 1,350,000 shares.

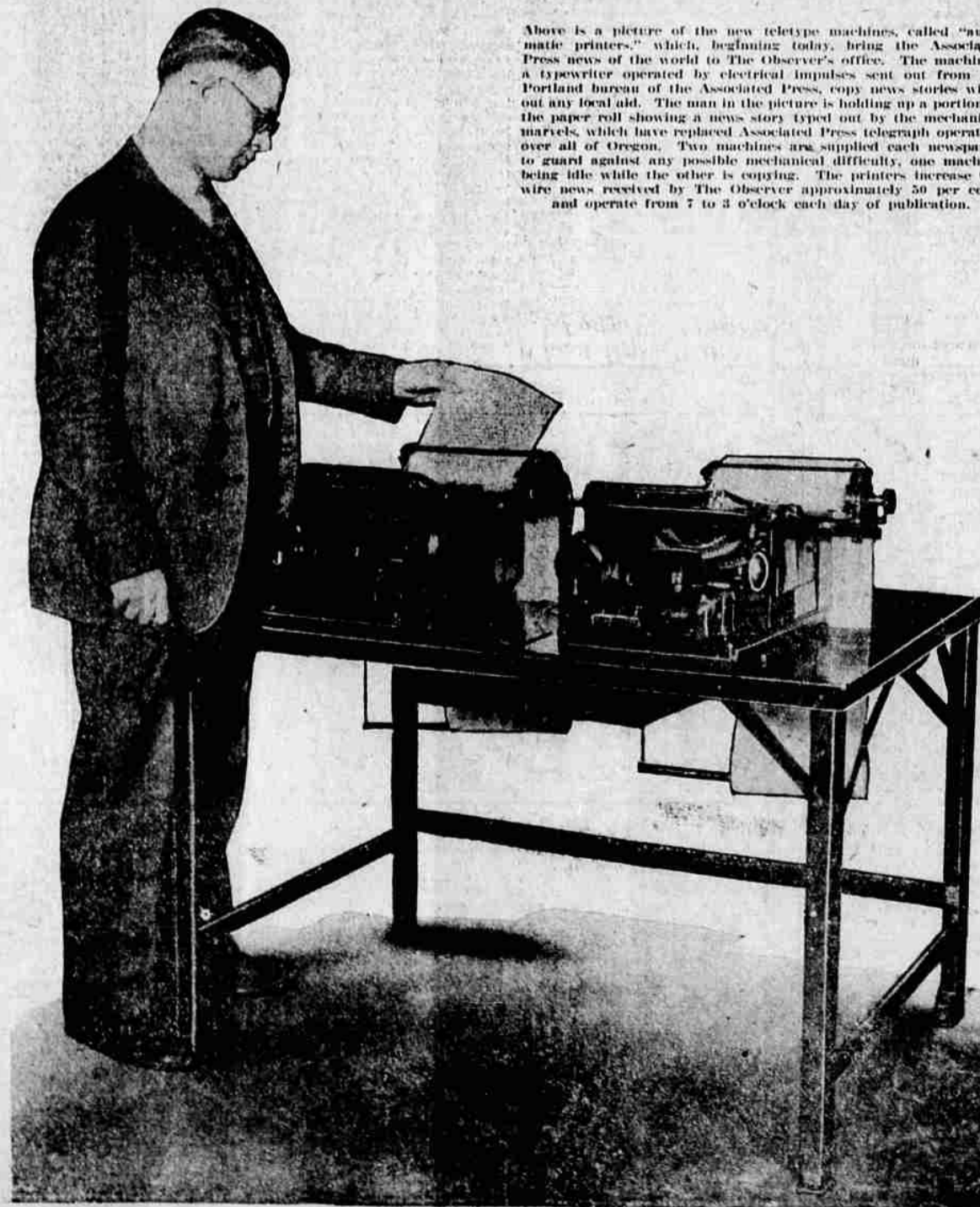
Wheat Unsettled, Lower At Closing

CHICAGO, July 16 (AP)—Opening 1/2 to 1 1/2¢ off, Chicago wheat underwent an additional sag, but then rallied somewhat. Corn and oats were also weak, with corn starting 1/4¢ to 1/2¢ down, and later showing a more pronounced decline. Provisions held firm. Wheat closed unsettled, 1/2 to 1 1/2¢ net lower; corn 1/2¢ to 3/4¢ off; oats 1/2 to 1c down, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 30c.

Telegraph Machines Deliver News to Observer



Above is a picture of the new teletype machines, called "automatic printers," which, beginning today, bring the Associated Press news of the world to the Observer's office. The machines, a typewriter operated by electrical impulses sent out from the Portland bureau of the Associated Press, copy news stories without any local aid. The man in the picture is holding up a portion of the paper roll showing a news story typed out by the mechanical marvels, which have replaced Associated Press telegraph operators over all of Oregon. Two machines are supplied each newspaper to guard against any possible mechanical difficulty, one machine being idle while the other is copying. The printers increase the wire news received by the Observer approximately 50 per cent, and operate from 7 to 3 o'clock each day of publication.
