FIRE LOSS OVER STATE RUNS HIGH

Klamath Owned Box Factory and Portland Knitting Mills Blaze KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 18 (AP)—Fire late yesterday burned the Crater Lake box factory at Bray, Cal., with a loss estimated at \$100,000. The lumber yard was saved after a strenuous fight. The plant is owned by Klamath Falls men. Flames have broken out in the heat lands of Lower Klamath lake on a large lease held by the Lower Klamath Lake Grazing association. It is expected to burn until snow files next winter.

PORTLAND LOSS \$40,000 PORTLAND, Ore., July 18 (AP)—Fire at the plant of the Columbia Knitting mills last night caused a loss estimated at \$40,000. Prompt action by firemen in spreading tarpaulins over a large stock of knitted goods held down the damage from water, and a large part of the \$200,000 machinery equipment escaped.

No Federal Aid In Sight For Projects SALEM, Ore., July 18 (AP)—At present there is no possibility of federal aid for distressed irrigation projects in Oregon. This was the unanimous assertion of members of the Oregon congressional delegation who were today called into conference by the state reclamation commission. Federal aid, it was said, would require new legislation and a complete change in the existing reclamation policy of the government. It was agreed that federal aid to existing projects rather than the appropriation of money for new projects would be good business, but that it was beyond the realm of possibility at present.

AL GETS DATA FOR ACCEPTANCE TALK ALBANY, N. Y., July 18 (AP)—Although Governor Smith has not yet plunged into the actual preparation of his acceptance speech, he is assembling data for it. Already he has a complete background on fiscal operations of the federal government obtained first hand from Representative Byrns, of Tennessee, ranking democrat on the house appropriations committee, and in the next few weeks probably will discuss various phases of governmental policy with other congressional leaders.

ONE DEAD, ANOTHER DYING FROM BLAST CHICAGO, July 18 (AP)—One man died early today, another was dying and six others were suffering from severe burns and other injuries following an explosion late yesterday of acetylene gas tanks in the air reduction company's plant. Fire swept through the building as a series of blasts from 100 tanks fed the flames. It was at first feared that a dozen employees might have been trapped in the one story structure.

"Pullman" Auto In La Grande On Way to The East

How would you like to travel across the nation in a Lincoln automobile that had all the advantages of a Pullman car, plus the delight of privacy, the fun of a radio and the joy of "taking your own sweet time"? This is what Mr. and Mrs. George E. Feagans and Dr. and Mrs. Charles S. Morsman, of Los Angeles, who spent most of today in La Grande, are doing. Their car, which they term a pullman, caused its share of excitement and drew many curious onlookers this morning on Adams avenue.

As different from the average run of "convertible" houses on wheels as is a thoroughbred dog from a scrub pup, the pullman car is a marvel for beauty and utility of design. Mr. Feagans, a Los Angeles jeweler, is the owner and Dr. Morsman is the designer. Mrs. Feagans is a cousin of Mrs. Harry Grove, a former well known La Grande resident, while Dr. and Mrs. Morsman are the parents-in-law of Alfred E. Powers, dean of the extension school at U. of O.

The machine is low slung and Dr. Morsman, in designing it, has not sacrificed the lines of the car. Local folk, commenting on it today, were agreed that it looked like neither a bus nor a truck. It has four berths, two of which fold up while the other two become four restful chairs for riding, electric lights which can be used with an extension cable, screened windows, refrigerator, individual clothes chests, lavatory, gasoline stove and kitchen equipment. The machine has a wheel base of 15 feet.
