

TUNNEY, HEENEY FIGHT THURSDAY

With Heavyweight Battle Near, Both Appear in Fine Condition

SPECULATOR, N. Y., July 19 (AP)—Dangerously near fighting weight, Gene Tunney, who will risk his world's heavyweight title against Tom Heenev, the powerful New Zealand Blacksmith, just a week hence was given a holiday today.

The champion was down to 180 pounds, almost the weight he will carry when he enters the ring against Heenev, and from now on his days of strenuous preparation are few. He will probably work hard tomorrow and again next Monday.

During the next 24 hours, Tunney will decide whether he will fly to New York with Commander Richard Byrd, on the day of the titular fight or travel by motor. If he chooses a motor he will stop to visit James J. Corbett, former heavyweight champion at Wappingers Falls, N. Y.

HEENEY IN "THE PINK" FAIRHAVEN, N. J., July 19 (AP)—As far as conditions go, both mental and physical, Tom Heenev, Gene Tunney's challenger, looks perfect. He is the picture of an athlete in shape. The prescription drips off him, but he hardly draws a long breath when he finishes his workout. He seems to have the energy of a dynamo.

All this pleases Jimmy Hennessey, his trainer. Hennessey, cornered today at the Rumson Farm camp, said he had a "hunch" that Heenev will defeat Tunney, perhaps knock him out.

"He's a better fighter than the public believe," Hennessey said. "He has shown plenty of boxing brains down here and improves every day. Why do you know that he has been the short ender in

the betting in all of his fights, yet he won them.

"I never saw a boxer so quick to solve an opponent's style. If Tunney hits him with left hands, it will be in the first two or three rounds. After that, Heenev will be all wised up to Mr. Tunney. Heenev is no sucker at getting away from punches. He isn't hit nearly as often as you think. And he is a tough puncher to face for 15 rounds.

"He has been trained to keep on top of his man, and goes right back at them after the clinches. Tunney will not be able to step in to Heenev often as he will be busy keeping away from Heenev's charges."

Strong Forces Oppose U. S. In Olympic Games

NEW YORK (AP)—Although Uncle Sam's track and field athletes have been victorious in all the Olympic Games contested up to date, they have met sustained opposition from five other nations, all of which will be in the forthcoming fray at Amsterdam.

These five incidentally are the only countries besides the United States which have scored points in all of the last five Olympiads.

Of these U. S. rivals, Great Britain and Sweden have made the best showing over this period, while Finland has come up from eighth place in 1906 and tenth in 1908 to finish third in 1912 and as runner-up threaten American supremacy in 1920 and 1924.

The other two nations which have always managed to score some points are France and Italy. The following table shows where the five finished in each of the various years.

TOD MORGAN TOO MUCH FOR MARTIN

Cannonball Eddie Fails in Attempt to Lift the Champion's Crown

NEW YORK, July 19 (AP)—Cannonball Eddie Martin, one-time king of the bantamweights today had nothing but deep and lasting scars along with the knowledge that Tod Morgan too was covered with lumps to show for his second assault on the junior lightweight title.

The slim, frail-appearing kid from Seattle, who looked as though he might break in half under Martin's vicious body thumping, came through a storm of terrific punishment last night to save the crown in a 15-round engagement that drew 20,000 spectators to Ebbets field and \$29,000.

Morgan Gets Eight Rounds

Although Morgan, according to the Associated Press score sheet, won eight of the 15 rounds while Martin gained but four with three even, the battle was close all the way with shades alone deciding many of the decisions. Only in the thirteenth round was there danger of a knockout and then it was Morgan, the champion, who reeled around the ring, battered from pillar to post by the challenger's lunging, driving attack.

The battle was gory enough to rival Gene Tunney's famous bleeding session with Harry Greb several years ago. In the very first round, a butt opened a gash over Morgan's left eye, while Tod slashed Martin's right cheek open in the third. Morgan added a dripping nose to the spectacle in the sixth and in the tenth the challenger's right eye brow was cut to the bone. Both fighters were stained crimson to the waist.

Champion's Optic Closed

Martin smashed a left hook to the champion's right eye in the fifth round and before the battle was over the optic was closed and puffed out inches from the rest of his face.

Morgan's cleaner punching, better boxing ability, and ring generalship gave him an edge in the first three rounds. Martin's aggressiveness and constant plunging to close quarters won him the fourth, fifth and sixth, while the champion took the rest with the exception of the thirteenth—Martin's best session—and the eighth, eleventh and fourteenth, which were even.

Some doubt regarding the dues of Mr. Ruth could be noticed among the White Sox in the ninth inning at the Yankee stadium yesterday. The Babe smashed a bat at Ted Lyons with perfect ease. Two Yankees were out. Combs and Keough were on base, and the White Sox led by 5 to 6. Lena was firm in his refusal to pass the winning run to first base, with the result that the Babe combed his thirty-sixth home run into the right field bleachers to nose out the Chicagoans by 9 to 8.

The Cleveland Indians broke out of their slump—if losing to the Yankees when they are interested may be construed as a slump—by shading the Red Sox in ten innings at Boston, 6 to 5. The Athletics took another from the Tigers in Philadelphia, 5 to 1. The other American league teams were idle.

Pirates Win Ninth

The Pirates would be champions of the world if the other fifteen teams were the Phillies and the Braves. The Buccaneers made it nine straight against this opposition by slugging the Bostonese, 16 to 3, yesterday as a few terrified witnesses stood by powerless to halt the brutality. Burleigh Grimes won his fifteenth victory. Vic Aldridge, just for a moment, is not even in the National league records.

The Reds raised their stock somewhat by taking two decisions from the Robins, 11 to 10 and 2 to 1, while other first division teams remained idle. It was not reported, however, that the Cardinals had any fewer than their customary eight hours of sleep.
