TUNNEY ON EDGE FOR HEAVY FIGHT

Enters Last Phase of His Training—Heeney Resting Because of Heat

SPECULATOR, N. Y., July 20 (AP)—Gene Tunney today entered the last stage of his training for the defense of his world's heavyweight title against Tom Heeney in better physical shape than he has ever been in his career.

In addition, he was probably better fitted mentally than he ever has been since he took up boxing for a livelihood. He has been training here for almost three months and during that time but two incidents have occurred which caused him any annoyance.

One was the attack on the New York boxing commission accredited to Tunney, and the other was a business dispute that he intended to settle from the ring after the Heeney match, regardless of the decision.

Both of these incidents came up during the past week or so but Tunney, by his prompt denial overcame them without damage to his high string temperament.

Late this afternoon Gene was slated to go through the first of his last three training sessions with his sparring partners, Harold Mays and Billy Vidaneck, the Bayonne, N. J., heavyweights. The champion is on the verge of fighting edge and the encounters were expected to be the most savage of the campaign.

It is no secret in the Tunney camp that the champion will try to eliminate the New Zealand challenger by his right hand punches and his actions with the sparring partners have indicated that he will keep Heeney outside with his famous left jab, the punches that won his title as he tries to batter down the rugged Blacksmith with powerful right hand body blows.

Tunney has already signed a contract with Tex Rickard, promoter of the championship contest, for next year. The terms call for a fixed percentage instead of the flat guarantee. This means that the days of fabulous purses have ended unless the boxers can draw them through the gates. Tunney has admitted that his hold of the cash customers will be increased considerably if he disposes of Heeney in approved manner, by a knockout.

Ruthian Drives Give White Sox Plenty of Grief

By Herbert W. Barker (Associated Press Sports Writer). Babe Ruth is nothing if not obliging. He has slugged three homers in the past two days and they've won two ball games for the New York Yankees.

On Wednesday Wiley Moore needed three runs in the last inning if he was to save himself from defeat at the hands of the up and coming Chicago White Sox. The Yankees got two men on base and they scored ahead of Babe when he slammed homer No. 36 high and dry in the right field stands.

Against the same White Sox yesterday Herb Penneck was unsteady most of the way but the Babe pulled him through to a six to four victory by propelling his thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth circuit clouts into the stands, each time with Earl Combs on base.

Way Ahead of 1927 These two Ruthian drives put the "Big Bam" 27 games, 25 days and eight home runs ahead of his 1927 schedule when he slugged 69 for a new record.

The Athletics shaved half a game off the champion's lead by turning back the St. Louis Browns in both ends of a double bill, 2 to 0 and 4 to 3, the latter in 11 innings. Owen Carroll pitched the Detroit Tigers to a 9 to 3 triumph over the Washington Senators in the first game of a double header but Milt Gaston reversed matters in the second, the Senators walking off with an easy 7 to 2 win.

Ed Morris registered his 13th pitching victory of the year as the Boston Red Sox evened the series with Cleveland, 3 to 2 in 11 innings.

Over in the National league the St. Louis pace-setting Cardinals added more woe to the unucky Phillies. The Cards just barely nosed out a 6 to 5 verdict that marked the Phil's eleventh straight defeat.

Meantime the Brooklyn Dodgers snatched a nine-game winning streak rolled up by the Pittsburgh Pirates, 3 to 0. Doug McWeney had a slight edge on the Young Pirate southpaw, Fred Fussell, the Dodger hurler accounting for the last two of his team's runs in the ninth when he drove in two men with a single.

Boston finally managed to end a nine-game losing streak by pouncing out a 9 to 4 verdict over the Cincinnati Reds. The Reds called upon four pitchers to stem the tide but it was to no avail.

AMERICAN TEAM IN AMSTERDAM

Olympic Athletes Given a Great Welcome Upon Arrival in Europe

AMSTERDAM, Holland, July 20 (AP)—The American Olympic team, in fine fettle and ready for the historic games at the Amsterdam, arrived aboard the steamship President Roosevelt at 1:45 o'clock this afternoon.

The President Roosevelt, who sighted entering Amsterdam harbor about 1:30 p. m. and at ten minutes of two the vessel was in the dock amid the cheers of many spectators who crowded the pier to welcome the American athletes.

American Davis Cup Team Takes First 2 Matches

AUTREUIL, France, July 20 (AP)—America's Davis Cup tennis players, minus Tilden, produced a great surprise today by winning the first two singles matches of the interzone final contest with Italy, both in straight sets.

After Francis T. Hunter had defeated Placido Godini in the first match by 6-1, 6-1, 6-0, John Hennessey downed Baron Humbert De Morpurgo, 6-4, 7-5, 6-2.

Tennis drama of the highest sort was packed into the Hennessey-Morpurgo match as the young American, after a poor start, fought his way up from behind in both the first and second sets to win them and then swept the third and deciding set at top speed.

The overwhelming victory of Hunter in the first match exceeded the hopes of American supporters but it remained for Hennessey to provide the real upset of the day by downsing the Morpurgo who was heavily favored to win both his singles matches.
