MENUS

By Sister Mary
BREAKFAST — Bartlett pears, cereal, cream, liver and bacon cakes, graham muffins, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON — Ham timbales, potatoes au gratin, andive with French dressing, grandmother's raspberry pudding, milk, tea.
DINNER — Veal birds, creamed carrots, tomato and cucumber salad, apple pie, milk, coffee.
Ham timbales use up all scraps of ham in a most appetizing fashion. Two well-beaten eggs are added to 1 cup of thick white sauce, and 2½ cups finely chopped cooked ham are stirred into the mixture. This is baked in well-buttered custard cups placed in a pan of hot water.
Grandmother's raspberry pudding originally was served with thick, clotted cream. On a farm this still is available, but city dwellers must substitute whipped cream.

Grandmother's Raspberry Pudding
One quart berries, 1 cup sugar, 1-3 cup water, bread, butter.
Combine sugar and water and melt over a low fire. Add berries and simmer 20 minutes. In the meantime cut thin slices of bread, trim off crusts and spread with softened butter. Butter a bowl or pudding dish, and fill with alternate layers of bread and berries, making the first and last layers of bread. Press firmly so that the bread will absorb the berry syrup. Chill for several hours. Unfold when ready to serve and serve with whipped cream.

Bridge Pointers

CONTRACT BRIDGE
Continuing the discussion of Slam Bidding at Contract, it cannot be accepted as sound doctrine that when both partners have bid the same suit upon their first opportunity to declare, the suit in question is set. It might be that an original bidder with a four-card Major who had started with one Heart and whose Heart had been jumped by his partner to two, would wish to bid three of a Minor on the second round, not as a slam bid to show the Minor Ace, but because that Minor might be a better game-going vehicle.
A Dealer who held:



and started with one Heart, would want to show the Diamonds if his partner bid two Hearts; and, by doing so, to announce greater length and probably greater strength in the Minor than in the Major. (Rightly a Minor after partner has jumped an initial Major bid of one almost surely says, "Partner, I started with a four-carder and the Minor I am naming is a five-carder, at least as strong—probably stronger—than the Major.") But if Heart bids by both partners are to set the declaration for slams, necessity of announcement of the Ace of Diamonds, and might interfere with the reaching of the best declaration for the combined hands. North might have jumped with only three Hearts and prefer to play with Diamonds the trump.
Again if South bid one Spade, West passed and North held:



he would jump the spades (to bid Hearts would deny normal support for Spades); but if the Spade jump were overcalled or re-jumped
