KILLER MAY FACE LINE OF RIFLES

Police Tightening Net of Evidence Against Oregon's Slayer
MEXICO CITY, July 21 (AP)—Police today were tightening the net of evidence against Jose de Leon Toral, accused slayer of President-elect Alvaro Obregon.
It was expected that a public trial of the slayer would be started soon after the expiration on Monday of a writ of amparo, or injunction restraining police and military authorities from taking any action against the slayer.
Investigation into the various phases of the killing went forward as additional arrests were made.
The investigation will continue upon the same line that has marked it hitherto—that is, the responsibility of the Catholic clergy," said General Antonio Rios Zertuche, chief of police.
The newspaper El Sol asserts that terror prevails in Catholic circles. This is said to be particularly true in Guadalupe, where the shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe, Mexico's patron saint, is situated. With 1428 priests of the shrine who since the religious laws became effective have performed no services but, dressed as laymen, have continued to live in the vicinity, are said to have gone into hiding.

Japan Abandons Neutrality In Chinese Strife

TOKYO, July 21 (AP)—Chang Hsueh-Liang, military governor of Manchuria, has been warned by Japan against joining Manchuria with the nationalist government of China.
Premier Tanaka and the army chiefs were certain that trouble would ensue if Manchuria should succumb to the nationalist regime. It is believed generally that Japan can take no action if Chang disregards the warning. Consequently many Japanese think that the government erred in thus committing itself against the Southern Chinese.
The refusal to discuss the situation failed to conceal entirely the surprise of authorities here at the development and their failure to comprehend its significance in view of previous assertions of Japan's neutrality as between the conflicting Chinese groups.

Battle Planes Pass In Review In San Diego, Cal.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., July 21 (AP)—Approximately 130 planes of various types will pass in review over North Island, beginning at 10 a. m. today. The aerial exhibition will last for about two hours.
All planes of the battle fleet and those from the carriers Lexington, Saratoga and Langley will participate in the maneuvers and review, it was announced yesterday afternoon by Commander Eugene E. Wilson, chief of staff of Rear Admiral Joseph M. Reeves. The planes will pass eight times over the reviewing stand, flying in different formation each time they pass.
At the close of the ceremonies today, Admiral Reeves, commanding the aircraft squadrons, battle fleet, will present the aviation burgee to the squadron which gives the most creditable flight performance.

Erickson Holds Small Lead In Montana Vote

HELENA, Mont., July 21 (AP)—Related returns from primary election continued to increase the small majority of Governor J. E. Erickson for the democratic gubernatorial nomination.
With 1428 precincts reported all but 42 of the total in the state, the governor's majority was 604. He was credited with 24,112 votes to 23,509 for Roy E. Ayres of Lewis-ton.
