JOINT MICE

"Joint mice" work as much havoc in a joint as do the mice in the pantry, and are often quite as elusive. Bits of hardened cartilage, sometimes attached and sometimes loose in the joint, they float about and become wedged between the articular surfaces, suddenly locking the joint and producing severe pain. Such attacks may be accompanied by considerable swelling and fluid, or "water on the joint." Operative removal is the only satisfactory treatment.

These joint mice vary in size from a millet seed to a large pea. They may be caused by a direct blow, fall, or crushing accident, or by sudden tension or twisting of muscles or ligaments. Not uncommon in athletes, they occur oftenest in the knee joint, probably because of the frequency with which this joint is exposed to wounds and strain, but may also follow injury to the shoulder, elbow and wrist.

The symptoms may not appear until months or years after the injury, or they may become noticeable almost immediately.

Operation may be difficult as the smaller joint mice are often hidden and only the most careful search of the joint cavity will reveal them. The analogy with the pantry mouse is again applicable, for if even one tiny joint mouse escapes the surgeon's eye or finger, and is left in the joint, it will gradually increase in size, and by arthralgia about will detach other pieces of cartilage which will in turn harden and become joint mice.

I recently removed 64 joint mice from the shoulder of a young engineer who had received repeated football injuries at college. These were regarded as minor, and had been neglected. Manipulations at first afforded temporary relief, but had only aggravated the condition. Pain and throbbing in the shoulder whenever he sat with his arms folded, became so annoying that he finally consulted a physician, who took an x-ray which revealed a large number of joint mice, and the patient was referred for operation. The motion in the shoulder was limited, and the strength much less than that of the other arm.

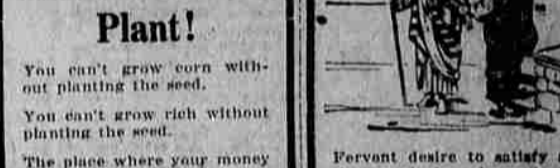
