TILDEN TO FACE LA COSTE FRIDAY

Big Bill's Reinstatement on Davis Cup Team Eases Situation

PARIS, July 26 (AP)—"Big Bill" Tilden's international tennis future rests upon the outcome of his singles matches against Rene Lacoste and Henri Cochet in the Davis cup challenge round, starting tomorrow.

The lanky Philadelphia, reinstated for play against the French defenders after he had been discarded because of alleged ineptitude, said today that unless he came through his matches against the two top-ranking French ones, with "flying colors," he was through with international competition.

Tilden Delighted

"I am glad to be given the chance to play my last Davis cup matches with the United States," Tilden told the Associated Press today. "If I don't come through these next two battles with flying colors, I am through. I never will play international tennis again."

And in a gentle jibe at his critics, the American team captain added: "Therefore all France must do to win the cause for amateurs is to get Lacoste and Cochet to trim me."

Tilden's disqualification on the grounds of ineptitude had come on the grounds that he violated the amateur rule of the United States Lawn Tennis association by his newspaper articles on the British championships at Wimbledon where he was a competitor.

Tilden vs. Lacoste

The pairings for the opening singles encounters in the challenge round pit Tilden against his old nemesis, Lacoste in the feature match tomorrow. John Hennessy, outstanding American player in the inter-one final against Italy, meets Cochet in the other match. The Cochet-Hennessy battle is not receiving the attention it ordinarily would from French fans who believe the Tilden-Lacoste match will furnish the real indication as to whether the tricolor is to successfully defend the cup it won at Germantown last year.

The Tilden-Lacoste match is set for 2 o'clock. Hennessy and Cochet will take the courts two hours later.

Neither the French nor the Americans have made up their minds as to the make-up of their doubles teams. If France wins both singles matches tomorrow she probably will depend upon Jean Borotra and Jacques Brugnon for the doubles on Saturday. Otherwise Brugnon probably will team with Cochet. The American doubles pair is even more in doubt. Although Tilden and Francis T. Hunter probably are the strongest doubles combinations, there is doubt whether "Big Bill" can stand three gruelling days of competition.

With everybody in the American league, save only Jacob Ruppert, vainly seeking ways and means to halt the Yankee outrage, the humble Tigers stepped to the plate with their own version, and made it the more convincing by rolling the champions of the world in the dust of Navin field twice in the same afternoon.

Suspecting that some 20 hours on the Pullmans had affected the champions, the Tigers won the first game of a doubleheader by 3 to 2. The home boys became holder in the second engagement which they snatched from the leaders by 16 to 7.

Hally Brings Victory

The first decision was won by an important rally against George Pipgras for three runs in the eighth inning. Henry Johnson, Myles Thomas and "Archie" Campbell were treated impartially in the second brawl.

While these unbelievable events were taking place in Detroit, the Athletics were winning two from the White Sox, and by this act cutting two games from the lead of the Yankees.
