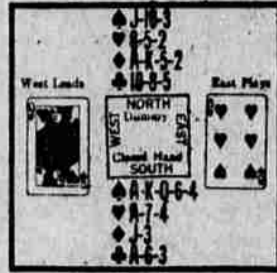

Bridge Pointers

Today we give the third of a series of three playing situations which apply equally to Auction Bridge and Contract Bridge. Spades trump, score love-all (nothing-nothing). Queen of Hearts led.

Today's Hand



Declarer's Plan
Declarer sees that, unless he can obtain a discard, he stands to lose two Hearts and two Clubs; and consequently game. To exhaust the trumps and then to lead the Jack of Diamonds with the idea of finessing would not be effective because, if the Queen be in the East hand, it would take a Diamond trick; and while, in that case, South could obtain a Club discard, that discard would be offset by the loss of the Diamond. If the West hand, it would cover the Jack and no extra Diamond would be made up to give the desired discard.

Therefore Declarer should plan to play the hand in the following way:

Win trick 1. Lead a small Spade from Closed Hand to trick 2, winning it in Dummy; and lead a small Diamond from Dummy to trick 3. If West have the Queen of Diamonds, this play will neither gain nor lose. It will cost a Diamond trick but will enable Declarer to obtain a Club discard. But if East have the Queen of Diamonds, the play will be effective because East doubtless will win the first Diamond trick with the Queen, and then lead a Heart. The adversaries of course then will take in two Heart tricks, making a total of three tricks; after which they will lead a Club which Closed Hand will win, lead one high trump, and the Jack of Diamonds, and then put Dummy in with a trump, probably exhausting the adverse trumps and giving Closed Hand two Club discards and producing game.

This plan will not work if one adversary should hold four trumps, but it is the only way in which winning game can be expected and therefore should be tried.

UNDULANT FEVER—A NEW DISEASE IN OREGON

There have recently come to the attention of the State Board of Health several cases of undulant fever, a disease hitherto unknown, or at least unrecognized, in this state. The term undulant is applied to this disease because it is characterized by waves of fever lasting a week or so alternating with periods of several days when there is no, or little, fever. Undulant fever is also known as Malta fever because the disease was first observed on the island of Malta in the Mediterranean Sea. There, as well as in other parts of the world where Malta fever occurred, human infection was traceable to the use of goat's milk. In this country undulant fever has been largely contracted by the use of milk from cows that had previously lost their young, a condition known as "contagious abortion." The few cases discovered in Oregon drank milk from cattle that were known to have aborted. The germ causing Malta fever, bacillus melitensis, can be distinguished only with the greatest difficulty from the germ causing contagious abortion, bacillus abortus.

Contagious abortion in cattle presents a serious problem not only in the health hazards offered to consumers of raw milk, but also in the tremendous loss in dollars and cents to the dairy industry of

this state. Dr. W. H. Lytle, State Veterinarian, estimates that from five to ten per cent of the herds in the Willamette Valley are infected with the germ causing contagious abortion, and that the loss to the dairymen is easily over one and a half million dollars annually.

Undulant fever has often been mistaken for typhoid fever, particularly where the disease has been of a mild type. Danish authorities assert that there are more cases of undulant than typhoid fever in Denmark. The number of cases of undulant fever has increased remarkably in the United States in the past year because of correct diagnosis of the disease.

The chief symptoms of the disease are loss of appetite, loss of weight, marked weakness, headache, chills, fever, profuse sweating, and frequently pain in the joints. The average duration of the illness from the onset to convalescence is three months, but cases lasting a year or longer are not at all rare. The mortality is very low. The germ may be found in the blood stream and in the urine. In suspected cases blood for the agglutination test should be submitted to the state hygienic laboratory. All cases of undulant fever should be reported to the state board of health. The patient should be kept in a modified quarantine. Discharges should be disinfectant, and all sanitary precautions employed in the control of intestinal diseases should be applied to undulant fever.

The existence of undulant fever in Oregon is another argument for the pasteurization of milk. In rural communities where pasteurizing plants are not available, milk from infected cows should be boiled before drinking.

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Power Company Buys Oil Rights In Idaho, Oregon

BOISE, Idaho, July 6 (AP)—Control of 45,000 acres of oil and gas land in Western Idaho and Eastern Oregon was taken over by an unnamed power company of Minneapolis through completion of a deal yesterday between Oakley Curry and Edward Cudaby, both of Chicago, and Idaho interests.

F. W. Skillern of Boise sold outright the rights and leases of 30,000 acres and the holdings, leases and proposal property of the Idaho-Oregon oil company of Payette, Idaho, were also taken over. The consideration was not revealed. Skillern announced that the Minneapolis company would immediately begin development of the large acreage.
