# AT THE THEATERS

## Lon Chaney at Arcade in "Laugh, Clown, Laugh"

Before an audience of more than seven hundred people in a huge replica of a European theater, Lon Chaney made his bow, for the first time in many years, as a vaudeville performer, playing a clown as a headline attraction. The vaudeville performance takes place in his newest picture, "Laugh, Clown, Laugh," now playing at the Arcade theater.

Chaney as the tragic clown of the noted play, the role Lionel Barrymore created on the stage, presents a complete vaudeville act, and proves himself a clever comedian in this detail of the new Herbert Brenon production. Later in the play, in the episodes behind the scene, he plumbs the very depths of tragedy.

The new picture was staged on a sumptuous scale at the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studios. The huge theater scene, in which hundreds of people took part; a vaudeville bill of professional players; majestic Italian palaces and other huge details, marked the making of the picture.

Practice makes perfect and for that very reason Ken Maynard, star of "The Canyon of Adventure," the Western feature produced by Charles H. Rogers for First National Pictures, which comes to the Colonial theater Friday, spends long hours every day, practicing stunts to perform before the camera.

Ken, as everyone knows, began his career stunt riding in a circus. He went through engineering school to please his parents, but became a trick rider by choice and knows through long years of experience that a trick has to be perfect before it can be shown to the audience. Many of Ken's stunts are breath-taking not only in appearance but in actuality. They call out all the stamina and nerve a man can muster, but when he makes it a business he has to be doubly sure of what he is doing.

For that reason Charles H. Rogers, the producer of Ken's pictures, has a fully equipped gymnasium for his star, as well as a stable and practice field for to perfect and improvise new stunts.

Not far from the First National studios there is a large tract of ground given over specially to Maynard and Tarzan. First Ken tries out the stunt and then teaches it to Tarzan, and then the two of them practice it until perfected. Several of these new stunts are seen in "The Canyon of Adventure." It is crisscrossed with action and thrills and Ken supplies the majority of them.

Others in the cast include Virginia Browne Price, Eric Mayne, Theo. Lorch and Bill Franey. Albert Rosell directed and Harry J. Brown supervised the production.

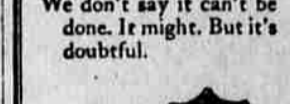

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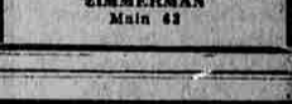
