LEMONS HIGHEST IN YEARS TODAY

Acute Shortage Responsible—Tomato Demand Is Strong

PORTLAND, Ore., July 27 (AP)—Lemons were at the highest prices in several years on local wholesale markets this morning with dealers asking from \$12 to \$13 per crate. Acute shortage of local supplies are responsible for the high prices, as values at California shipping points are not reported substantially increased. Liberal shipments of lemons are expected to arrive here Monday.

Cob corn was cheaper this morning, going to the trade at \$1.50 per sack for the yellow varieties and \$1 for the white.

Apricots of good quality were going all the way from 50 to 90c this morning, while Oregon Alexander peaches ranged from 50c to 75c per crate. California Elbertas were bringing around 90c for the best. Plums and pears were also in generous supply and cheap, especially suitable for canning.

Tomatoes continued to bring strong prices, with the bulk of supplies local and The Dalles stock going at \$2.75 per 20.

A temporary shortage of new potatoes was noticeable this morning. Best new potatoes sold as high as \$1.75 per sack early. Old potatoes were unchanged.

Country dressed meat markets were exceedingly dull, with trading almost at a standstill. Large accumulations of beef were reported with demand small.

Best hogs were quoted 150c per lb.; best light veal at 21c and lamb 20c per lb.

Poultry quotations were steady and unchanged.

Butter and egg markets were both firm. The only quotable change in prices was on standard extra grade eggs, which advanced 1/2c to 25c per dozen.

WOOL REPORT

BOSTON, July 27 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"The demand for wool this week has been limited but more general than for several weeks, although the market must still be described as quiet. Wool values are quite five percent below the recent peak prices. As yet there has been no marked reaction in consequence of the opening of lightweight fabrics for the next spring season by the American Woolen company at prices highly competitive on the finer wool staple goods. In the west business is at a standstill."

"The foreign markets are rather on the quiet side and Bradford evidently is inclined to talk lower prices for the coming Australian clip and the new clip of the Southern Hemisphere. Generally, East India wools were strong for carpet, descriptions at Liverpool, but clothing wools were neglected."

"Mohair is rather quiet but very firm."

Stock Recovery Makes Headway; Favorable News

NEW YORK, July 27 (AP)—The recovery in stock prices made further progress today under the influence of favorable trade news and an ample supply of call money. Early gains of 1 to 7 points were

distributed over a broad list, with motors, copper, rubbers and airplanes giving the best demonstrations of group strength. Several weak spots developed during the session but they failed to stem the upward surge of prices.

Banks called \$5,000,000 in loans but there was no strain on call money, which remained unchanged at 5 1/2 per cent. The influx of out-of-town funds attracted by the possibility of higher call money rates

over the month-end helped to ease the situation.

The closing was strong. High-priced specialties were in brisk demand in final dealings. American Smelting rose 3 points to a new peak at 284 1/2, and Case Threshing advanced 3. Gains of 2 to 7 points were made by Radio, Wright Aero, Warren Bros., International Harvester, International Nickel and U. S. Steel. Total sales approximated 1,300,000 shares.
