WHAT TO DO FOR SUNBURN

WASHINGTON (AP)—The general public has been so impressed with the value and necessity of sunbaths in the prevention and cure of illness that people in some instances have gone to extremes and severe sunburn has resulted. Several cases of persons who have become quite ill following extensive sunbaths have been reported to the public health service.

Sunburn over large areas of the body may be as serious as burns from other causes. While sunlight is of great therapeutic value to children and adults, exposure to the powerful violet rays should be given in proper doses. Exposure should be gradual or sunburn will result. At first the baby or child should be given direct sunlight for about 10 minutes. This period may be increased from three to five minutes daily until the child receives approximately one hour in the morning and one hour in the afternoon. This will vary in some cases, depending on how the skin reacts. For adults the initial exposure may be longer and the in-

crease larger each day.

In case sunburn does occur, it should receive prompt and careful treatment. The following treatment has been found effective: Take one-half a pint of hot water and stir into a level tablespoonful of boracic acid powder; then add 20 drops of carbolic acid and shake well. The solution should be dabbed on the inflamed skin with a small piece of cotton or sprayed on with an atomizer. It should not be rubbed into the skin. It can be applied every half hour if necessary. If no medicine is available, cold compresses will give relief to badly burned areas.

Farm Pointers

Recent experiments reveal that in using the Brown-Duval tester, 200 degrees centigrade is the correct temperature to which shelled peanuts and rought and brown rice should be treated to determine their moisture content.

Experiments show that Diplodia seedling blight of sweet corn can be largely prevented by dust or liquid treatment of the seed. Dust treatments are more consistent in their beneficial effects, are more easily applied and involve less risk

of injury to the seed than liquid treatments.

Current and gooseberries, wild and tame, act as host to white pine blister rust. This fungous disease can be checked and the damage to white pines eliminated if all current and gooseberry bushes in the vicinity of white pine or sugar pine trees are eradicated.

It is a serious mistake to use any unsound, immature or poorly ripened fruit in the manufacture of cider or apple juice. The apples should be at a stage between "market ripe" and "dessert ripe." In case the orchard is picked clean for the market, the sound culls from the grading should be stored for ripening or sweating. With rare ex-

ceptions the flavor of cider can be improved by judicious blending of the juice from several varieties of apples.

When cutworms are troublesome in the garden in early spring there is likely to be a renewal of activity by the next generation later in the summer. A poisoned bait is an effective control when scattered about the infested area. It may be made by mixing an ounce of Paris green or white arsenic with one and one-quarter pounds of dry bran. To this is added a liquid composed of four fluid ounces of molasses or sirup and half a pint of water.

Six new records were established by the navy seaplane PN-12 No. 2. Lieut. A. W. Gorton was pilot and Boat-swain E. E. Rieber was with him. The records are one for endurance, two for range and three for speed. The plane carried a "pay" load of 2000 kilograms for 16 hours 39 minutes and 51 2-5 seconds. This distances the previous record by more than an hour and a half. The speed records were for carrying that load at an average of 83 miles an hour, and for carrying two lesser loads at not less than that speed. The range records were for carrying 1000 and 2000 kilograms a distance or 1350 miles without stop. Some flights are more spectacular, but the good old navy continues to plug on and get results.

TREATIES AND RECOGNITION

One thing is said to stand in the way of official recognition of the Chinese Nationalist government by the government of the United States. This country feels wholly friendly toward the Chinese and hopes to see that country unified under a responsible government. The Nanking government just now is said to desire American recognition above all things.

The stumbling block is the matter of extraterritoriality, the system which insures to foreigners in China the privilege of being tried by their own consular courts instead of by native courts. It is expected that as soon as a new Chinese government is recognized by any of the powers negotiations will be commenced toward the framing of new treaties relinquishing the unequal terms under which this country and other western powers are allowed to dictate Chinese import duties and enjoy other special rights and privileges.

It is pretty generally recognized that the "unequal treaties" ought to be scrapped and new treaties, more just to the Chinese, framed. Yet it is easily understood that the western powers are reluctant to give up their special privileges.

One step at a time is all that is ever necessary to take, in learning to walk or in solving knotty diplomatic problems. Friends of China in other countries wish that the Nationalist government could be recognized promptly as one immediate possible step. With the good will which that would engender in the Chinese people, perhaps the treaties would present less of a problem than they do today. It is a step worth trying, at any rate, as a sincere gesture of good will and friendship toward a great nation in the making.
