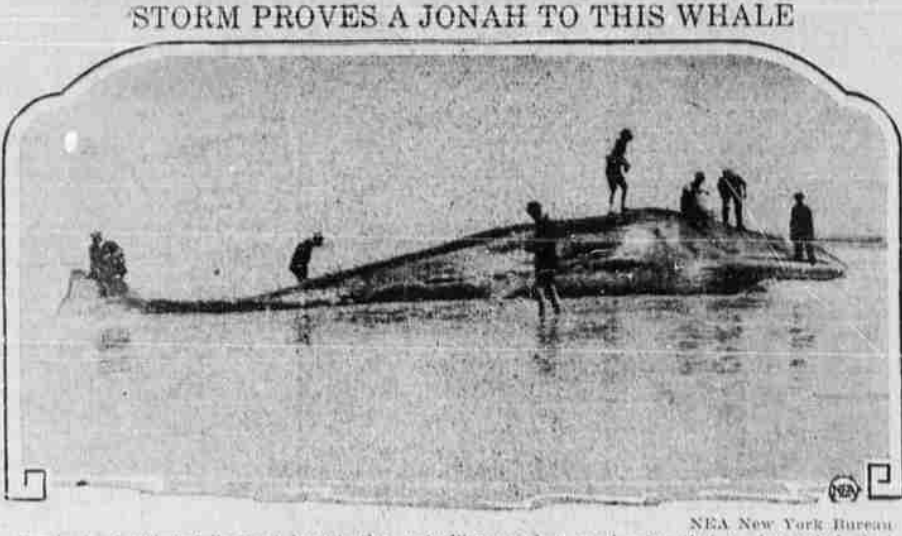

Tunney's bout with the New Zealand champion drew slightly over 41,000 to the Yankee stadium and the net receipts totaled little over \$500,000. The promoter's losses from all sources amounted to \$200,000.

His More than Million In addition to the \$275,000 he received for fighting Greener, Tunney has taken part in the two

great title shows ever staged. The match in which he won the heavyweight title from Jack Dempsey at Philadelphia, Sept. 23, 1926, drew a gate of \$1,000,000. To the Sesqui-Centennial stadium, Gene conquered Dempsey again at Chicago on Sept. 22, 1927, in a match that broke all records for receipts with a total of \$2,500,000. Tunney was guaranteed \$250,000 for his first match with Dempsey and \$300,000 for the second.

The heavyweight champion is believed to possess through careful investments a fortune of well over \$1,000,000. He is the second heavyweight champion to retire undefeated. The other, Jim Jeffries, came out of retirement on July 4, 1910, and lost to Jack Johnson at Reno, in a vain effort to win the crown back.
