A PRIZE RECIPE

Banana Cream Pie—One Crust
Make and bake one pie crust. When cool, slice in two bananas. Take 2 cups milk, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 pinch of salt. Cook this mixture in a double boiler. When it is cool, add two tablespoons flour and cook until thick.

Before removing add the beaten yolks of two eggs. Let this cool and then spread over the bananas.

FOOT ROT IN WHEAT TO BE STUDIED HERE

Dr. Hurley Fellows, of the United States department of agriculture, stationed at Manhattan, Kansas, was in the valley Saturday and during his stay made arrangements for field tests to be started this fall in a study of the foot rot disease found in wheat. One point for which definite arrangements were made was one the Claude Woodell farm near Imbler. Here different varieties of wheat will be planted at different times, under different conditions etc.

The tests to be made here will be watched with no little interest by all wheat growers of the valley. Foot rot is a disease for which at the present time, no control is known, and those who are interested and have suffered damage from this disease are hoping that the solution of the problem may come a little nearer through the tests to be made in this locality.

Morning Glory Treatment Will Be Given Test

Through the office of County Agricultural Harry Avery, ten barrels of sodium chlorate crystals, the new material to be used in fighting morning glories, have been ordered and from the demand at the present it may be necessary to increase the order to accommodate those who wish to make the test this late summer and fall. This new treatment, which was tried out first in Kansas and has been used very effectively wherever tried, is just being tested in this valley for the first time. The effectiveness of the material and the low cost has been very appealing, as other methods used previously have been as much as to have been prohibitive in the majority of cases. Mr. Avery said that those ordering the material may find it even less expensive than had been first reported. The figures given at that time was based on the quantity of material which was used. When Mr. Hyslop was here last week, however, he reported that in tests made in the Wallawette valley, it was found that in many cases one spray was sufficient and in many more only two were required. He said all that was necessary was to have the vines well wet with the liquid used.

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HYSLOP COMPLETES FIRST INSPECTION OF POTATO FIELDS

Potato growers hoping to have certified seed for the market next year should be very diligent in rooting their present fields of potatoes often during the next few weeks," said Prof. G. H. Hyslop, professor of farm crops of the state college, who was in the valley last week making the first inspection of potato fields. Mr. Hyslop expressed himself as being well pleased with the quality of the seed in the valley, but he pointed out the 17 fields inspected, finding the potatoes in better condition than he had expected.

Many of the fields inspected were passed by Mr. Hyslop, and in most cases these were men who had been growing spuds for a number of years and in every event they were men who used this year seed grown either in this valley or brought in from Baker. The last better field of 44 acres was pronounced the best field in the valley and one of the best Mr. Hyslop had ever seen, he said. In the 1500 plants examined there were found but 10 diseased plants, or the very low per cent of two-thirds of one per cent.

The diseases found in the fields inspected were rugose and mild mosaic, leaf roll, black leg, granular rhizomorphosis, chlorosis. The first named disease is one of the most virulent and that disease with leaf

roll would result in a considerably reduced yield. The other diseases in the list are not so serious, black leg being responsible for the biggest per cent of the diseases found.

The next inspection will come in about three weeks, according to Mr. Avery. This will be the last inspection until the final when the spuds are in the bin. Growers are hoping that the valley may have a good rate in the next year as the potatoes need it especially. Last year a drought with not north winds about this same time of year, was the cause for a number of fields failing to pass the second inspection.

During the round of investigation last week, both Mr. Hyslop and Mr. Avery were on the lookout for bugs in the fields, since Union county is one of the counties which has been under quarantine the past few years. Traces were found in only two fields in the 17 visited, although the fields were not carefully scrutinized for that purpose.

Mr. Avery stated that during Mr. Hyslop's stay a number of wheat fields were visited for inspection for certification purposes. The spring grain, however, was not found to be far enough advanced.

Certification cannot be completed, according to Mr. Avery, until growers have submitted fresh samples for examination.
