X-RAY SHOWS CAUSE OF EPILEPSY

A recent case of epilepsy showed a focus piece of bone within the skull as the cause. The case had an indefinite history of a head injury in childhood, but it was so long ago that the mother forgot all about it. At the age of sixteen, the child developed frequent attacks of epilepsy. An x-ray of the skull did not show any evidence of fracture, but it did show a small object the size of a pea under the dura of the thick brain membrane which was not attached to the bone shell. An exploratory incision demonstrated that this small hard substance could be removed by dissecting it out of the meninges of the brain membrane. It was later examined and proved to be a piece of bone. After this was removed the patient recovered. It was thought that these had been an internal fracture in childhood, but a detailed review of some hereditary cases of epilepsy became embossed in the brain membrane, which finally became an irritation that it caused the so-called brain spasm or epileptic fit.

The brain has two or three coverings, first the skull, then the dura, a very thick fascial membrane, then a fine spider-web-like membrane full of small openings, called vessels. In comparison of the brain, it is the mesh of blood vessels that is often affected.

Nature does a great deal to protect the brain with its hard body casing, its delicate membrane and different fluids within the cranium. Head injuries of all kinds should be considered serious and amenable to the best medical care. In certain cases, a fracture of the skull may be a serious matter, but in many cases it can be treated. Epilepsies are frequently cured by certain methods, which are usually applied in the neck and not in the head. George Brennan Gravely Ill Of Septic Poisoning

CHICAGO, July 21 (AP)—George Brennan, 63, Illinois democratic leader, was gravely ill from septic poisoning early today in John H. Murphy hospital.

Late last night Mr. Brennan received the sacrament of extreme unction, the last rite of the Catholic church for the living, from the Rev. Fr. Lawrence Lee.

Although Mr. Brennan's condition was pronounced slightly improved early today, a conference of five physicians issued the statement that "Mr. Brennan's condition is very grave." Mrs. Brennan, their daughter Mary, and State Representative Joseph L. Gill, brother-in-law of Mrs. Brennan, were at his bedside.

Under Knife

An emergency operation was performed last night by Dr. Karl Meyer in an attempt to prevent spread of infection caused by extraction of two teeth Thursday. A lung infection had developed and the poison spread through Mr. Brennan's entire system.

Until Thursday Mr. Brennan was seemingly in good health, though he had complained of his teeth. He was taken to the hospital yesterday, when friends first learned of his illness.
